A GOOD CONSCIENCE

Have you ever been kept awake at night by the voice of your conscience? Has that voice been telling you that you did something hurtful or didn't do your best in showing kindness? Well, there is good news for you. It's that likely you do have a good conscience, meaning a "healthy" conscience. This is different from just a clear conscience in the case where one is afflicted with a spiritual disorder of having no conscience, or a "sick," or bad conscience.

But, how do we silence the voice of our good conscience so that we can get some sleep? St. Maximos the Confessor prescribes "spiritual discourse" the best way to address this matter, because God knows us better than we know ourselves. Through "spiritual discourse," we are able to maintain a good conscience through prayer, the forgiveness of sins constant spiritual and

nourishment from the Holy Sacraments. St. Maximos notes, in his Two Hundred Texts on Theology & the *Incarnate Dispensation of the* Son of God: "Every spiritual discourse, sweetened with mystical contemplation, brings relief to the intellect...and frees it from the bad conscience which chokes it." (Philokalia, Vol. 2, pg. 646).

St. Maximos' solution to preserve a good science is affirmed by Fr. Stanley Harakas' reminder of God's goodness: "Orthodox ethic affirms that the human good is intimately related with the divine 'objective' good because humanity is not only created in the image of God...but is also designed to become - and ought to become - 'like' God..." (Toward Transfigured Life, pg. 35).

The re-birth of humanity's good conscience comes from the Baptism of Christ in the Jordan. With His Baptism, celebrated every year on January 6th, the

human conscience, is enlightened. Its first-created goodness is recovered. The voice of God the Father, together with the ministry of His Only-Begotten Son Jesus Christ and the grace of the Holy Spirit, is Itself the voice of the One God within us. We maintain our unity with the goodness of God's love as we participate in our Lord's Baptism by being baptized in the Name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Holy Baptism.

The effort to be like our Lord requires a personality ready to fight against evil and temptations as Christ did in the wilderness against Satan's temptations. This effort itself is a life-style. We prevent our good conscience from becoming sick by constantly turning to Christ in repentance; for, should we fall into temptations of evil and sin, we repent by participating in the Sacrament of Holy Confession

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helps us to develop the Christ-like personality exhibited by all the Saints. As a matter of this "personality," then, we make the daily effort to radiate the Divine love.

St. Nectarios of Pentapolis gives a succinct description of this daily effort: "Take off every form of enmity between you and your neighbor; take off every form of unjust thinking;...flee from every manner of evil and do that which is good; turn back to the Lord and draw near, so that you can be sanctified entirely. Be enlightened and become a vessel of Divine Grace so that you may be joined to Christ and dwell in Him as He would dwell in you." (Regarding the Sacraments, pgs. 58-59).

In sum, a *good* conscience is one which dwells in God, listening to His voice and prompting one to always do God's Will, which is always good. +FR. THEODORE

CHRISTMAS ENCYCLICAL 2018

Beloved in the Lord,

And the angel said to the shepherds, "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; for to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:10-11

The Orthodox theologian Paul Evdokimov wrote, "We prove God's existence by worshiping Him and not by advancing so-called proofs." At the Great Feast of Christmas, each one of our churches become a symbolic Bethlehem, carrying us to the manger where we find the newborn Child, Jesus. In our Vigil and Liturgy we will sing praises to the Almighty God as we hear the story of the Birth of our Savior. The news that Christ is born, once again, will fill us with joy and hope and we will take this message from our parishes to our homes and the world around us. That is the proof of our faith! This is how the Birth of Christ makes a difference in our salvation; that we are able to share with action this wondrous message from above. In the Holy Liturgy during our celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord, we will receive Christ the Lord as we sing the Com-

(the "Second" Baptism). This kind of life-style munion Hymn that teaches us the purpose of the Incarnation: "The Lord sent redemption to His people."

> In this cynical age when various pundits regularly question the existence of God, what better response can we offer than filling our churches with hymns of praise? When the world around us makes Christmas all about searching for "the right gift", what better response can we offer than sharing the Good News that the Savior is born? When we encounter those who sow seeds of division and relish in polarization, what better response can we offer than working even more diligently to strengthen the unity of the Body of Christ? Arguments will not change hardened hearts. Only our faith, our love for our neighbor, and our compassion can soften them.

> In the Nativity of Christ, the Kingdom of God enters this world and we celebrate that "God is with us". He came humbly, as an infant, reminding us that the Kingdom of God enters in places and ways that are not always dramatic or revolutionary, but rather quite ordinary. The Kingdom of God is at hand in the ordinary activities of our lives: in our homes, at our family gatherings, in our workplaces, in our neighborhoods. When we treat people with kindness, justice and compassion in our day-to-day activities, we bear witness to the Kingdom and grow closer to God. Saint Gregory the Theologian wrote, "God comes to live with human beings, that we may journey to- ward God" (Oration 38). Our journey to God begins with our journey to the symbolic Bethlehem, where we may meet the Savior, who "became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). Then we can return to our daily lives filled with hope and begin to work to make all things new.

> There is much work to be done. When we see the many sufferings of our neighbors, in the Alaska earthquake, the fires in California, as well as the ongoing injustices that continue to be perpetrated in our society, we must turn our minds and hearts to the Good News that the Savior is born

and redemption has come to His people. We must ask ourselves how we will bear witness to the Kingdom of God in the face of these tragedies and the conditions of so many. Our first action should be prayer for those who suffer. Second, we can make charitable and philanthropic gifts to offer support. Third, speak the truth to those who are sitting in places of authority. Fourth, we can involve ourselves in the work of assisting those who have no voice and need help through our parishes and as responsible citizens of our country.

Beloved in the Lord, this Christmas Holiday is a new opportunity to go to our symbolic Bethlehem, see the newborn Christ, acknowledge Him as your Savior, and take His message of salvation into the world through your words and actions. Let us go to Bethlehem, the city of David, and meet Christ the Lord.

THE CHURCH & WELLNESS HIPPA and the Family

Among the levels of stress and anxiety that we can feel, most often the highest levels are those associated with the health and care of our loved ones. It goes both ways: the patient is concerned about the feelings of loved ones; the loved ones are worried about how they can contribute to the recovery and health of their beloved - and if their efforts will be rewarded with the return to wellness.

Stress and anxiety often come from the *unknown*. The anxiety is understandable, especially in light of St. Paul's First Epistle to the Corinthians, in which he reminds us that we are all one body in Christ and each of us is a member of It. With this he added, "If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored all rejoice together." (1 Corinthians 12: 26). Suffering from an illness or disorder carries with it the "unknown" factors: 1) What is the nature of the illness? 2) How is it to be treated? 3) Who is going to perform the treatment? Will it be applied correctly and will the treatment work? These are questions that arise in the hearts of both patients and their loved ones and the answers are not always simple.

Enter HIPPA. HIPPA is an acronym that stands for the *Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act*. It was put into effect nationally in 2003. It is designed to provide privacy standards in order to offer protection to patients from having their medical records sent to other health care providers without permission. In practice, however, this law has been used to insure privacy on all levels of the patient's life. As a result, physicians and counselors are prohibited from revealing anything about their patients or clients without their written consent. In fact, they cannot even admit that they even know the patient or client. On the clinical level, medical centers cannot admit that a patient is at all present in their facility.

Pastorally, this means that if anyone is in a hospital, there is no way for the priest to know this, unless he is directly informed by either the patient, or (with the permission of the patient) his or her

family or friends. Also, unless the patient gives permission to the doctor or therapist, conversations regarding the status of the patient cannot be entertained between the physician/therapist and family members. All that family members can do is to provide one-way communication to the physician giving him or her information about their loved one. Medical feedback from that one-way communication will not be forth-coming. However, it will always be useful to providers.

It is critical to understand that if the patient expects his or her family to provide a caring atmosphere at home when he or she is discharged from the hospital, unless their consent has been given to at least the one family member with whom he or she will reside while recovering, the family is hand-cuffed in terms of knowing what to do and how to do it. On the other hand, when it comes to family, keeping things confidential can always be dicey.

Looking at "trade-offs," however, when family is informed and involved when one returns from the hospital, they are more prone to join with their loved one in seeking wisdom for better treatments through prayer and the Holy Sacraments. A greater relationship of understanding and compassion among all is fostered. As a result, then, I would opt for erring on the side of a patient giving consent to the physician or therapist to discuss matters pertaining to one's health to at least the family member with whom the patient will be residing during recovery. +FR.THEODORE

ST. BASIL THE GEAT: AN IMPORTANT SAINT FOR US!

When we look at January and the start of the New Year, we find St. Basil on the first day of the year. We remember him on January 1st, as well as on January 30th, at which time he is commemorated as one of the Three Hierarchs, along side St. John Chrysostom and St. Gregory the Theologian.

St. Basil had much in common with the other Hierarchs. They were all well educated and committed to the learning from the ancient Greek world. St. Basil was an expert in learning Attic Greek and could read and recite Homer. He studied the ancient philosophers, such as Plato and others.

St. Basil was from a Christian family. His dedication to education and his Attic Greek was good enough that one of his works, *To the Youth,* is the basis for a class of the University of Greece on Attic Greek. In short, he was a bridge between ancient Greek culture and the culture of Byzantine Christianity.

Recognized as a great spiritual Cappadocian father, among Orthodox Christians he is known as the "Revealer of Heavenly mysteries." With others of his time, he helped in the theological fight against the teachings of Arianism, which taught the falsehood that Christ is not God. St. Basil also led in teaching the True Faith in confronting other heretical teachings.

As the bishop of the territory of Cappadocia, St. Basil performed the Divine Liturgy which bears his name: The Liturgy of St. Basil the Great. This Liturgy contains mystical silent prayers of the priest that are most outstanding, showing in great detail prayers for all people and their needs. One commentator tells us that the Liturgy of St. Basil "bears unmistakably the personal hand, pen, mind and heart of St. Basil the Great." St. Basil's Liturgy is celebrated on most Sundays during Great Lent; on his Feast Day (January 1st); on the Eve of the Nativity of Christ (Christmas); on the Eve of Epiphany (January 5th); on Holy Thursday and Holy Saturday during Holy Week.

Having been born into a wealthy Christian family, St. Basil gave his own wealth to the poor. He founded hospitals, orphanages, hospices and monasteries. Also, St. Basil had a big impact on monasticism. His teachings influenced St. Benedict in the West and became the model for the monastic life in the East. To understand the Orthodox Christian life of monasticism, we must come to know St. Basil.

Through his sermons, St. Basil sought to close the gap between the rich and the poor. His demands on money and possessions challenge Christians today. His treatise, "The Six Days of Creation" is an illuminating writing on the Book of Genesis, which does not demand that Christians keep to literal 24 hours of creation, noting that God's "day" of creation could be very different than our day.

As bishop of Cappadocia, St. Basil faced challenges from enemies of Orthodox Christianity. For example, the Emperor Valens tried to have him dismissed from his duties as bishop, to which St. Basil responded, "You may take away my lands and possessions, but you can never take away my faith." Valens rebuked St. Basil, complaining that no one ever spoke to him in such a courageous manner. St. Basil responded, "Perhaps you never met a bishop before!"

In Greece, as well in other Orthodox Christian countries, it is traditional to exchange gifts on St. Basil's Feast Day, in honor of St. Basil's reputation for giving to those in need. He is also remembered in Orthodox parishes with the "Vasilopita Cake" offered when the New Year is celebrated. In the cake, a coin is placed for a person in need to receive it as a gift. Many poorer Christians received such generous gifts from St. Basil who was always concerned for the welfare of all.

May the wisdom of St. Basil the Great catch all of us in the awareness of his Spirit.

THE NEW RED ALTAR COVERINGS

We received our new red Altar coverings just in time for the celebration of our Lord's Nativity. We are grateful to God for Lula Valissarakos, who led in the efforts to produce these Altar coverings from material purchased from La Lame in New York City. Ana Doubaratzis, Athena Snarskis and Pam Zeverdas, worked with Lula throughout much of the summer. In time, these wonderful fabrics became the beautiful red Altar coverings. We are also grateful to God for those who donated the monies needed to purchase these fine fabrics.

We now have a full set of coverings which will cover the Holy Altar and our liturgical stands in accordance with the liturgical colors of our Church. Beginning with the liturgical calendar from January on, these colors are:

White: for the washing away of sin, repentance, and the manifestation of the Holy Trinity, in celebration of the Theophany; in celebrating the salvation of humanity in the Unending Light of the Resurrection of Christ (the Easter/Paschal Season). White is the color of our Baptismal robe.

Gold: in honor of the non-martyred saints: ascet-

ics, theologians and hierarchs and for liturgical periods unrelated to Feast Days associated with the Theotokos or our Lord and Savior.

<u>Purple</u>: for season of Great Lent. A purple robe was put on our Savior when, in mockery, He was hailed as "King of the Jews" during His Passion.

<u>Green:</u> for the commemoration of the Life-Giving Holy Spirit (the Pentecostal Season)

<u>Blue</u>: in honor of the Theotokos, Who is "more spacious than the Heavens" (the season of "Dekapentavgousto" - the 15 days of August) and the first part of Advent (the Presentation of the Theotokos in the Temple in mid-November).

<u>Red</u>: in honor of the humility of Christ (His Incarnation, Passion and Crucifixion), the Holy Cross (in September); the commemoration of martyred saints; the fasting season for the Holy Apostles.

2018/2019 STEWARDSHIP UPDATE

2018 -- Our current fiscal year of 2018 is coming to a close. We have met our stewardship goal but still have some outstanding pledge balances that we hope to receive prior to year-end. Currently

the outstanding balance is \$8,034 due from 19 stewards. We will be sending out reminder letters to all with an outstanding balance towards their pledge after January 1st, 2019.

2019 -- Our new Stewardship fiscal year begins January 1st, 2019. We have been handing out pledge card packets for the past three Sundays of December after Divine Liturgy and have kept a record of who has received them. All remaining parishioners will receive their packet by mail prior to January 1st, 2019.

ST. GEORGE MEMORIAL WALL & GARDEN PROJECT

We would like to announce that a memorial wall & garden project for our Saint George Orthodox Church has been formalized and received bids for the initial manufacture and installation of a 4 ft. by 40 in. aged bronze wall that will hold 64 nameplates sized 2 1/2 in. by 10 in. The nameplates will memorialize those who have fallen asleep in the Lord.

Phase 1 of the memorial wall and garden project has been funded by an anonymous steward of our church and we are extremely grateful for this donation! The aged bronze wall, to be manufactured by W.E. Baum, will be mounted on the wall to the left side of the bell tower. A bench and flowers will be added to the beds surrounding and across from the wall to enhance the aesthetics and to give a peaceful surrounding for those who wish to meditate or pray for their beloved who have passed.

The next Phase of the project will move to the right hand side wall of the bell tower. Plans are to increase the height of the wall to 6 ft., to accommodate up to two additional bronze memorial walls, and to add a fountain and benches in the area.

We are in the process of final edit for our Saint George Memorial Wall & Garden. Once the final proof is complete, **W.E. Baum** will manufacture the wall with delivery time expected to be 8 weeks. We are hoping to have installation finished by the beginning of the 2019 Lenten Season.

- -- The need is to keep pushing the Advertising Logo's. The prices are \$150, \$300.00, \$500.00 and \$1,000.00. Tina informed the Board that the Vendor Letters were mailed. The next order of business will be the parking lots.
- -- The agenda for the Fall General Assembly Meeting, held on Sunday, December 9th.

Notes from the Fall General Assembly Meeting are as follows:

- --The Endowment Fund is going very well. Reports will be issued by Chairman Nicholas Latkovic on a quarterly basis beginning in 2019.
- --Stewardship Sundays will be hosted by Rhonda Latkovic on Sunday, December 16th (as a reminder to those who can still bring their 2018 Stewardship Commitment up to date *and* to thank those who have completed their 2018 Pledge commitment) and January 20th (to pass out the 2019 St. George Stewardship Cards and to update parishioners on the ministries of our parish going forward).
- --2019 Budget... was passed, showing an income of \$437,346.88 and The projected expenses of \$417,279.76, leaving us with a projected profit of \$20,067.12. Questions pertaining to "coding" of financial categories and the final 2018 Festival figures are to be addressed in the near future by the Parish Council and are recorded in the official minutes of this General Assembly Meeting.
- --2018 Election Committee was selected: Nancy

Breighner, Pat Dalkas, Alexandra Dymond.

- --Auditing An addendum was submitted following the Fall General Assembly in order to detail the auditing work over the past year. This addendum is available in our parish office upon request and it will be presented at the Spring General Assembly Meeting in March.
- --2019 Festival: Companies or individuals can select the Sponsorship Levels that will include full colored on back of the Festival Program-Gold Sponsor Level\$1,000.00 or Silver Sponsor Level \$500.00. We also have advertising choices which include black and white logo inside the Festival Program- Corporate \$300.00 and Personal \$150.00. The deadline is January 15, 2019.

On December 18, 2018, the Parish Council met briefly to approve the recommendation to acquire parish property and liability insurance from the Church Mutual Insurance for annual premium cost of \$7,940 for greater overall property and liability coverage compared to last year. Many thanks to Mike Vawter for his hours of work in analyzing costs and coverages for 2019 as compared to 2018 in helping the Parish Council make this decision.

Also, the Parish Council expressed sincere gratitude to the President of the Desert Cancer Foundation, who donated the costs for upgrading the air conditioning and heating units for our building next door to our church which is rented to the Desert Cancer Foundation. The value of this donated work is about \$8,000.


