OPEN THE GATE OF REPENTANCE

One of the characteristic features of our desert cities community is the abundance of "gated communities." Nine times out of ten, it seems, going to visit someone's home involves going through a gate at the entrance of the community. Waiting to be "buzzed in" inspired me one day to think about the approaching Lenten Season, which begins on Monday, March 11, 2019. The process of being "buzzed in" requires that either one needs a pass code and the permission of the resident to enter.

The Church speaks about two gates -- the gate of repentance which opens the gate of Paradise. "Open to me the gates of repentance, O Giver of Life, for early in the morning my spirit hastens to Your holy temple, bringing the templeof my body all defiled." (Orthros: Idiomela for March 10th)

We stand outside the gate

of Paradise because of sin. Adam and Eve were expelled from Paradise as the result of their disobedience to God-for it is disobedience to God which constitutes sin, which makes us lost to God. Their expulsion was actually their departure from God, which made them unworthy of Paradise. As Adam and Eve learned, blaming others never absolves us of making every effort to follow through with our responsibilities. We are each responsible for "fighting the good fight" against "principalities; against powers, and against the rulers of darkness, which is of this *age..."* (Ephesians 6:12).

We often find ourselves to be weak in "fighting the good fight" against the powers of darkness. In repentance, we turn to our Savior in prayer, asking for His blessing and guidance; for, without Christ, we can do nothing. With Christ we can gain the

wisdom to discern between God's Will and the things that are against God.

In his book, The Lenten Spring, Fr. Thomas Hopko shares the words of St. Anthony the Great: "...I want God to give you a heart of knowledge and discernment, that you may be able to offer your hearts as a pure sacrifice before the Father, with great holiness, without blemish. Truly my children, evil spirits envy us at all times, with their evil counsel, and hidden persecution, and settlement in malice, and spirit of seduction, and their blasphemous thoughts, and their hardening of heart, and their many griefs which they bring upon us every hour...and the self *justifications at what we do,* and the judgments, which they set in our hearts, caus- Mailing Address ing us to judge our fellow people...and we are bitter against each other with hard words, grieving it every hour, accusing each other and not ourselves, thinking

that our trial is from our fellows, as we sit in judgment on what appears outwardly while the real criminal is all within our house, that is, within the inner reassesses of our soul." (Letter VI, by St. Anthony the Great).

It is time for us to stop taking the gifts God gives us as individuals and as a community for granted. It is time to stop taking each other for granted and to stop taking life itself for granted. It is time for repentance and forgiveness. Repentance and forgiveness are two sides of the same coin. Our Savior pronounced our forgiveness from His Cross and opened the gate of Paradise for us with His Resurrection from the dead. As God forgives, we we must repent.

Among our greatest distractions in the effort to pray is the unwillingness to forgive one another. What makes forgiveness difficult is our pride. Deceptions and pride go to together. With this combination working in us, we too often make assumptions that we are "totally right" and the other is "totally wrong." We too often fail to see the part that we play in our relationships.

For there to be forgiveness there must be *humility*. Humility is not simply a noun. It is the *Person* of Christ our God. St. Paul puts it this way: "Let all bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor and slander be put away from you and be kind to one another, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you. Be imitators of God as dear children." (Ephesians 4:31-5:1). Turning once again to Fr. Thomas Hopko, he reminds us of Fyodor Dostoyevky's book, The Brothers Karazmazov, where Elder Zossima says, "At the sight of other men's sins ... Always combat it by humble love." (Lenten Spring, pg. 37). Loving humility is an awesome force that leads to forgiveness, and, with Christ, to the Resurrection. +FR. THEODORE

February

We continued to help the Church with the preparations of appetizers and pastries for the Festival. Our members volunteered a lot of hours. Thank you members!

We continued our Outreach Program and we are expanding with a new project to serve the needs of the homeless. We could use underwriters to help defray food expenses.

February 19, 21 and 26 we fed the homeless through Street Life Project with food purchased from the Church Festival. We fed 210 homeless in three locations including Indio and Palm Springs. We also clothed the homeless through your donations and our purchases of gently used clothing such as jackets, sweat shirts, socks and other items. The loads of clothing were taken to Street Life on February 12, 14, 18, 21 and 26. They went to the homeless in Indio and Palm Springs at three Street Life Project stations. We donated enough clothing to give to 255 people. Thank you for your donations. See photos.

Saturday, February 23 from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. we had a booth at the Swing 'N Hop Street Fair on El Paseo. We sold bread and cookies made by us and other pastries purchased from the Church. We made approximately \$775.00. Several people stopped by and said they had been to the Festival, loved the pastries and bought more! It was a great way to represent Philoptochos and the Church.

On Monday, February 25 at 11:30 a.m. we had our <u>General Meeting</u>. Our guest speakers were **Father Ted** and **Rhonda Latkovic**. Rhonda spoke about Emotional Intelligence. She was employed by J.C. Penny for 35 years and was a management trainer for five years. Important points:

THE CHURCH AND WELLNESS Are our Words really God's Word?

In the Book of Genesis, the word for "word" has nearly the same meaning as do the words "let it be." It is not surprising, then, that we read the following: "Then God said, 'Let there be light!' and there was light!" (Genesis 1:3). The word of God is at the same time the power of God. The Word of God took on human flesh and is known as the Person of our Savior Jesus Christ. St. John tells us, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was God. (St. John 1:1). It should not be surprising then, that, in so far as we are created in the Image and Likeness of God, our words also have power and meaning.

The Holy Gospel is known to be the "Word of God." At the same time, when the priest carries the Gospel to the front of the church for the "Small Entrance" and raises it high, the message is given that Christ our God is with us, having entered into our human history and circumstance as Man—as the "Living Word." With this in mind, knowing that Christ is the only True celebrant of the Church's Sacred Services, passages from both the Old Testament and the New Testament are read throughout the year, culminating with the reading of the Gospel during the celebration of the Divine Liturgy.

In his article, "How to Read the Bible," found in the *Orthodox Study Bible*, Metropolitan Kallistos Ware, writes: "According to St. Mark the Monk, 'He who is humble in his thoughts and engaged in spiritual work, when he reads the Holy Scriptures, will apply everything to himself and not to his neighbor.'... 'Christ Himself is speaking to you.'" (pg. 1764). Our words to Christ in return are the prayers of the Church and the prayers of our hearts.

Every prayer is, more or less, modeled after the Lord's Prayer. We speak to God with love. This love is translated into the spirit of compassion and forgiveness as we relate to one another—"<u>Our Father</u>...Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

It seems to be an especially grave tragedy to find that we have accepted as "normal" words of

blasphemy, anger, negativity, slander, gossip and other sorts of malicious words. How can anyone with the same mouth that utters blasphemy turn around to say words of prayer? All the more does this question sober us, when we remember that words indeed have power. Classic Greek wisdom reminds us, "The tongue has no bone; yet, the tongue often breaks bones." Henri J.M. Nouwen cautions, "Words do something in me...They make me feel and think differently...These words have the power to heal or to destroy me." (With Burning Hearts, pg. 58). St. John Chrysostom is more graphic: "Let the mouth fast from disgraceful and abusive words, because, what gain is there when, on the one hand we avoid eating chicken and fish and, on the other, we chew-up and consume our brothers?" (Homily "On Fasting;" by St. John Chrysostom, www.orthodoxytoday.org)

Let us remember, however, that words come from thoughts. If our thoughts are inspired by God's Word, our words will reflect God's love. Dr. Henry Cloud emphasizes that our thoughts do indeed determine our feelings, "...Being in control of our thoughts is one of the secrets to controlling how we feel...St. Paul tells us, 'Take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ.' (2 Cor. 10:5)." (The Secret Things of God, pg. 54). Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica (Serbia), goes a step further, noting, that if our thoughts are Christ-centered, our whole lives become Christ-centered: "When a person has the Grace of God, his thoughts are unbelievably powerful, because it is the power of God Himself that acts in us." (Our Thoughts Determine our Lives, pg. 70).

Our good and peaceful thoughts come from our relationship with Christ God. Thoughts that arise from bitterness or hatred bring about turmoil and grief, because they are much too often based on pride and deceptions that lead us to make inaccurate assumptions. To have peace in our lives, let us be sure to have thoughts that are God's thoughts and say words that are God's words—or, in fact, His Word.





THE ANNUNCIATION: THE MOTHER OF GOD LEADS US TO SANCTITY

The Annunciation to the Ever-Virgin Mary (celebrated on March 25th) is one of the Church's greatest Feasts. The major source for this Feast Day is the Gospel according to St. Luke (1:26-38). Here we learn that the Archangel Gabriel appeared to Mary to announce that She will conceive and bear a Son, even though She "knew no man." According to Tradition, Mary had come home to her parents when She was 15 years old.

This date was chosen by the Saints of the Church exactly nine months ahead of the Birth of Christ, showing that Christ was conceived in perfection of time, "by the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary," as stated in the Nicene-Constantinople Creed. The words of the Archangel Gabriel to St. Joseph the Betrothed were: "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in Her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth and you will give Him the Name, Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins." (St. Luke)

This event is crucial for the coming into the world of the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ. Many saints of the Church have expounded on the meaning of this miracle. Some of them include, St. Athanasios, St. Gregory of Nyssa and St. Augustine.

The meaning of this Feast is given by the Troparion Hymn that is chanted as the Divine Liturgy is celebrated on this day: "Today is the prelude of joy for the universe. Let us anticipate the Feast and celebrate with exaltation: Gabriel is on his way to announce to the Virgin; He is ready to cry out in fear and wonder, 'Rejoice, O Lady Full of grace: the Lord is with You."

The "joy for the universe" is the gift of salvation offered by our God Jesus Christ, who entered upon the stage of human history through the obedience of the Ever-Virgin Mary. She lived in spiritual and physical purity in obedience to God's Commandments, allowing God's grace to overshadow Her.

To see what the Annunciation means to us, we must see how the Virgin Mary plays a leadership role for all of us. She is a true follower of Christ, even though, at first, She was skeptical about Her encounter with Archangel Gabriel. But, when the promise of Gabriel was made, Mary did not turn away from what God asked of Her, prompting the Archangel to say, "The Holy Spirit will come upon You and the power of the Most High will overshadow You. So the Holy One will be born and be called the Son of God." To this, in obedience, Mary responded in a way that all of us should respond: "I am the Lord's servant. May your word to Me be fulfilled."

She wife, he became Her obedient guardian.

So, we see here how God's promise was fulfilled by two people: the Ever-Virgin Mary and Joseph the Betrothed. We are also called upon by our Lord to follow their example by accepting the gifts of God and the opportunities that God gives us so that we can fulfill His plan.

Obedience to God means giving up our will in order to participate in the Divine Will. This "giving up of our will" means, to some extent, giving up what is not proper. The Lord sacrificed everything for our salvation. We must start sacrificing of ourselves for God in response to the gift of Eternal Life. Great Lent is a time for this to take place. We can sacrifice the over-abundance of foods. We can sacrifice time for prayer and, if we sacrifice with sincere faith in God, as did the Virgin Mary and Joseph, we will be awarded salvation. It should be a pleasant choice.



ST. GEORGE MEMORIAL WALL & GARDEN

As announced in the February edition of *The Voice of St. George*, we are in process of the development and manufacture of a memorial wall & garden project for our Saint George Orthodox Church. The bid from W & E Baum has been approved for a 4 foot by 40 inch aged bronze wall that will hold 64 nameplates sized 2 1/2 in. by 10 in. (sizes are approximate) Individualized nameplates will memorialize those who have fallen asleep in the Lord.

Phase 1 of the memorial wall and garden project has been funded by an anonymous steward of our church and we are extremely grateful for their donation! This donation is for the bronze wall itself but not the nameplates. The aged bronze wall, to be manufactured by W & E Baum, will be mounted on the wall to the left side of the bell tower. A bench and flowers will be added to the beds surrounding and across from the wall to enhance the aesthetics and to give a peaceful surrounding for those who wish to meditate, reflect, and pray for their beloved who have passed.

Phase 2 of the project will move to the right hand side wall of the bell tower. Plans are to increase the height of the wall to 6 ft., matching the height of the left wall, to accommodate up to two additional bronze memorial walls, and to add a fountain and benches in the area. Once the final proof is complete, W & E Baum will manufacture the

wall with delivery time expected to be 8-10 weeks. We are hoping to have installation finished by the beginning of the 2019 Lenten Season.

You must make the other person's pain your own, and then pray from your heart. Love is a divine attribute, and informs the other person [that you are praying for him]. Even in hospitals, when doctors and nurses feel genuine compassion for their patients, this is the most effective of all the medications to give to them. The patients feel they are being cared for with love, and have a sense of certainty, security and consolation. You do not need to say much to someone who is suffering, or try to instruct him. He understands that you feel his pain and care about him, and he is helped by this. Feeling his pain is everything. If we feel compassion for others, we forget ourselves and our problems. — Elder Paisios of the Holy Mountain (Athos).

I have shared this saying previously and it has great meaning. Feeling the pain of another ex-

poses us to our own pain which is why we hesitate to immerse ourselves in another's suffering... We don't want to "go there". However, if we are willing to for a moment expose ourselves to that pain it paradoxically helps us to put our own troubles aside and ultimately heal our own pain. If we are in communion with God and reach out and feel another's pain, Christ Himself can and will enter into this relationship between individuals. Compassion is not just "feeling sorry" for someone, it is taking on their pain and then giving it to Christ Himself. He took on all of our sins, all of our pain, all of our sorrow when He died on the Cross. We are called to hold onto another's pain, if just for a while and then give it to Christ so that His will be done, whether healing, strength or perseverance. As Christians we are "pain bearers" if we truly love others.
