## THE BLESSING GIVEN TO ST. SIMEON IN THE TEMPLE

On February 2nd every year we celebrate the Feast Day of the Presentation of Christ into the Temple.

When St. Simeon received the Christ Child upon His Presentation to the Temple, he said, "Lord, now You are letting Your servant depart in peace according to Your word; for, my eyes have seen Your salvation, which You have prepared before the face of all peoples, a light to bring revelation to the Gentiles and the glory of Your people, Israel." (St. Luke 2: 29-32). These words are heard during the Vesper Services, which are held on eves prior to the celebration of the Divine Liturgy on Sundays and in commemoration of a Feast Day of our Church throughout week.

Significantly, St. Simeon thanked God for "letting him depart in peace," rather than to suggest that he be simply "let to die." As followers of Christ, our departure from this life is not

"death," but a transformation from life in this present world to life in Christ's Kingdom. We live in this present life with anticipation of "the Resurrection of the dead and life in the age to come," as is professed in the Creed. Furthermore, as we strive to share in St. Simeon's love for God, we allow the "Light of Christ," to enlighten all people of every generation, race and nationality to the knowledge of our Lord's Eternal Love.

In commemoration of the Presentation of Christ into the Temple, we dedicate our children to Christ by presenting them to the Church on their 40th day of life. Let us continue to give thanks to our Savior for giving us and our children the gift of life.

We seek peace in so many unusual and unproductive ways. Passive entertainment, physical distractions...eating, drinking, drugs, self absorbed rituals and cultic pursuits. I am not going into specifics so as not to judge, but each of us recognizes this behavior in ourselves. These are false and temporal comforts that are

fleeting and lead to less peace and more anxiety and agitation. The peace we seek is from the Holy Spirit. It is obtained only through repentance and confession and immersion into the sacramental life of the church. Everything else falls short. Therefore when we humble ourselves and repent we naturally lean on our faith for peace and trust in the Holy Spirit. Symeon and Anna who greeted Christ at the Temple, shared one common quality....patience. They humbly waited decades to see Christ. Can we put aside earthly cares for a few minutes so we too can encounter Christ?

Often we think Grace is passive or contemplative. It is not, Gifts of Grace are acquired by actively fighting the devil through spiritual warfare and guarding ourselves agains the attacks he delivers to us. Ιt is actively quired..."the Kingdom of Heaven is take by force". Today we celebrate the Presentation of the Lord to the Temple. Where the Holy Symeon holds him and utters the beautiful sentiment...."Now let your servant depart peace...". The fulfillment of Symeon's life work, which was to behold the coming of Christ in the flesh, which he discerned through translating the Hebrew Scriptures into what we know as the Septuagint (in Ancient Greek, meaning the seventy) particularly the prophecy of Isaiah which foretells the coming of Christ. Let us actively invite Christ into our lives so that we may guard our souls and receive the gifts of Grace which we then use to glorify God.

### Archiepiscopal Encyclical on the Feast of St. Photios, Patriarch of Constantinople



"Their sound has gone forth unto all the earth, and their words unto the ends of the world." --Psalm 18:4, LXX

This year — the Centennial year of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America — we pause to

remember those who came before us, and honor the legacy of the pioneers of our Church in America. It seems only fitting, that on this Feast of the great and holy Patriarch Photios, we make special mention of the brave and stalwart πρωτοπόροι, whose voices brought the Faith of the Orthodox Christian Church to these shores. Thus, under the ever-memorable Archbishop Iakovos, our first National Shrine was established in St. Augustine, Florida, named for the great Patriarch — whose missionary endeavors are legendary — as a place of memory of those courageous souls.

The legacy of these early immigrants, who were the first waves of the Diaspora from Greece, Asia Minor and Cyprus, is visible in every community across our Sacred Archdiocese. Many parishes have established local archives and other methods of historical preservation, to cherish the stories and adventures of these often-unintentional missionaries. With their hopes and dreams for a new start and a better life in America, they also brought their deeply held religious values and beliefs. Wherever they settled - from the mountains of Wyoming to the shores Oregon, from the Great Lakes to the greatest of cities – they founded churches and community centers, where faith, language, and culture would be cherished and taught.

Our Saint Photios Greek Orthodox National Shrine is a visible symbol of the aspirations and the legacy of our forebears. And they are the spiritual ancestors to all of us — Greek and non-Greek alike — because they were the vessels in whom the seeds of our Archdiocese traversed land and sea to plant the Greek Orthodox Faith and traditions in the new world.

And so, in this One Hundredth Anniversary year of our Church in America — an Eparchy of the same Mother Church of Constantinople that the Holy Patriarch Photios led over one thousand years ago — let us honor the legacy of our foremothers and forefathers. Let us honor them in every parish across this great land, and by

## CHURCH & WELLNESS: Orthodox Worship and God's Wisdom

The very tone of the Divine Liturgy is that exemplified by the Publican. Like the Publican, we acknowledge that we are imperfect as a result of thoughts, motives, words and actions that have nothing to do with giving glory to God. We pray for forgiveness and Divine mercy throughout our Church Services. We are called to remember that forgiveness is God's Divine mercy! There is no joy otherwise. Through the Publican we are taught that the only way to deal with guilt is to repent and to seek forgiveness. While confronting our short-comings may sound "gloomy," turning to God for forgiveness is a joy. This is why we say that the Divine Liturgy is celebrated, not simply "performed."

With the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee on February 13th the pre-Lenten season of the Triodion begins. With this, we are reminded that the tone of Orthodox worship, in general, is nicely compared to the thoughts of St. Theophan "the Recluse" expressed as the spirit of the Publican. "We are watchful over two things: sobriety and discernment. The first is directed within, the second, outward. With sobriety, we observe movements which themselves come out from our hearts (yearnings, temptations, etc.). With discernment, we foresee movements which are about to be roused under the impulse of outward influences. The rule for sobriety is:...stand at the door of your heart and watch carefully everything that enters or goes out from there. Especially do not let acts be prejudiced by emotion and desire, for evil comes thence." (The Art of Prayer, pg. 129).

Worship and prayer are always a matter of having our focus on God and on God's Will for all to

be saved. While the "prayer-mentality" of the Pharisee leads to delusion and deception, the "prayer-mentality" of the Publican leads to truth and wisdom.


