# THE IMAGE OF PENTECOST



As much as Holy Icons are meant to be venerated by the faithful, they are meant to be "read" as expressions of Divine Truth. Two sources of interpretation are shared here. They are, Icons and

Saints of the Eastern Orthodox Church, by Alfredo Tradigo, and Behold the Beauty of the Lord: Praying With Icons, by Henri I.M. Nouwen.

Tradigo explains: "... The Mother of God, present at the Ascension, is absent in icons of Pentecost up until the seventeenth century. Bishop Innocent writes: 'How could She not be present at the moment of the Spirit's arrival, She Who conceived and gave birth by means of the Spirit?'...The composition of the icon, with the apostles seated in a horseshoe arrangement, recalls the icon of Christ teaching in the synagogue..." Tradigo goes on to explain, "The Apostles represent the community of the faithful, open to the action of the Spirit...While the Apostles are enflamed from above by the Divine Light, the old, imprisoned world below (the cosmos) awaits liberation from the shadows of evil." Tradigo notes that the figure depicted below the Apostles is the "Old King," who is king of the cosmos. (pg. 151).

For Henri J. M. Nouwen, "The Pentecost icon draws us into the heart of the mystery of God's Self-revelation. The way the Apostles

and evangelists are gathered together manifests the presence of the God-within. (pg. 93). Through the Holy Spirit, Christ is in our midst as an Apostolic community. Christ is also in the midst of each of our minds and souls. In this regard, Nouwen points out St. Paul's words, "I am alive; yet it is no longer I, but Christ living in me." (Galatians 2:20).

Following our personal baptism, the Gift of the Holy Spirit is poured upon us through the anointing of the Holy Myrrh (Holy Chrismation) -- our "personal Pentecost." We live out our baptized and chrismated lives though living a life of virtues reflective of God's love for all people. The Sacrament of Confession helps to strengthen our love for God.

Our "personal Pentecost" is indeed our participation in the full Sacramental life of the Church, through which the Holy Spirit descends upon us individually and collectively. Thus, our St. George parish today is to be the living image of Pentecost as we individually and collectively become *examples* of a way of life that draws others to the love of our Savior --i.e., to provide the world with the *image of Pentecost* and inspire those around us to also embrace the life of Christ.

## SPIRITUAL THOUGHTS by Deacon Euthym

"Christianity is a life rooted in Christ's own. Its charge is not to live for self but to live for Christ; and its goal is not satisfaction but transformation. The Christian is called to become, to enter into a newness of life that is another's – that is Christ's. He is to discover the 'self' of his current existence, precisely so that he can work to change it into a life not defined by his will, but defined and made real by another – by God Himself....Bishop Irenei Steenberg

Christianity is not a religion, it is the ultimate way all people transform so that their will is aligned with the will of God, Who created us and loves us and calls us to be in relationship with Him. It is the path to transform from participation in the fallen world to participation in the kingdom of God. It is, ultimately, putting on the new person in Jesus Christ, the incarnate God, and putting off the old person who is adrift, separated from God. St Athanasios said, "*God became man so man can be like god*". We are called to participate in His divinity. Christianity is the lifeboat of all of humankind's existence. Let us jump in and invite others to do the same.

The husband and the wife should be like the hand and the eye. When the hand hurts, the eyes should be crying. And when the eyes cry, the hand should wipe away the tears." --St. John Chrysostom

While a contemporary approach to relationships focuses more on compatibility, practicality, and a "what's in it for me?" mentality, then marriage essentially has been reduced to a transactional relationship. We see how St John elevates marriage to its authentic position as a Holy Mystery. Ordained by God to assist in our salvation, marriage is a sacrament whereby a man and woman freely, out of love, become one in Christ for the purpose of glorifying God, and assisting one another and their children toward salvation. Everything else fades away. It is not for everyone and the basis for every marriage is truth. Christ said

"*I am the Truth, the Way and the Life*". For those unmarried, contemplate on these sayings in seeking relationships. For those married, maybe it is time to reset the relationship with the above in mind. It is not easy, but ultimately, it is the greatest reward and brings the greatest joy.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL

Sunday, May 22nd was the last day of Sunday School for the 2021-2022 school year. It was truly a most successful Sunday School year, which saw a fun "pumpkin painting" fellowship; a wonderfully presented Christmas program; a wellcrafted "Sunday of the Saints," (whereby our students presented mounted reports detailing the lives of their Patron Saints); the "greeting card" project in support of our Philoptochos' efforts to minister to the homeless, and a Lenten Retreat, (which featured a lesson in "prosforo baking").

We are grateful to God for the participation of our students in our Sunday School program this year, as well as for the efforts of our Sunday School staff and the parents of our students.

Going forward, we pray for a few more parents to become involved in helping with Sunday School classes, serving as "substitute teachers," which will allow for maintaining consistency in holding classes on Sundays. When one of our teachers is unavailable on a given Sunday (given unexpected needs), substitute teachers are a blessing.

In addition, improvements can be made in terms of our parents bringing students to Sunday School classes on a more consistent basis. Every effort is made to prepare valuable lessons for our students so that they can be equipped to meet the challenges of an increasingly complex world, without losing their souls. This should be a vital concern of everyone in our parish, especially our Sunday School students' parents.

In the fall, we will be looking for volunteers to commit to helping our Sunday School staff to create and maintain a truly rewarding program for the entire family.

### PHILOPTOCHOS NEWS

Our final meeting before the summer vacation was held on Monday, May 9th at Shield's Date Garden restaurant. Twenty-three members were in attendance for the luncheon meeting. Attendees enjoyed dining al fresco under a canopy in a private section of the restaurant which provided the perfect opportunity to visit with one another. The meeting topics included an update to our chapter finances, & thanks to generous donations and several successful fundraising projects, our checking balance is at \$31,785. We announced a new local recipient of the Operation Classroom initiative, Gerald Ford Elementary School, to whom we made the first of two donations to fund their art classes for over 600 students! This summer we will be donating to the Coachella Valley Rescue Mission's water project and to The Narrow Door's food bank that helps local families with food insecurity. Our general members meetings will resume in September.

On Saturday May 21st volunteers from our St. George **Philoptochos, AHEPA, and Sunday School** packed food boxes at **The Narrow Door Food Bank** in Indio for local families with food insecurity. 




# **CONGRATULATIONS TO: CONSTANTINA KARALIS**
