HIS NAME IS: "GOD WITH US!"

"Behold, the virgin shall be with child and to know Him as God." (pg. 44). bear a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel, which is translated, 'God with us." (St. Matthew 1:23). The Incarnation of Christ is the fulfillment of the prophesy of Isaiah (Isaiah 7:14).

Man - the New Adam. The "New Eve" is the Ever-Virgin Mary. While the old Eve was created from Adam's rib, the New Eve's pure flesh gives birth to the New Adam through the work of the Holy Spirit. According to St. Athanasios the Great, "He takes a body of our kind, and not merely so, but from a spotless and stainless virgin, knowing not a man, a body clean and in very truth pure from [contact] from any man." (On the Incarnation of the Word, by St. Athanasios, Nicene-Post Nicene Fathers, Ser. 2, Vol.4, pg. 46).

St. Athanasios also notes that God made us in His Image and Likeness, and that we thus know God by virtue of our created nature. But, "People had so rejected God and so darkened their soul, as not merely to forget their idea of God, but also to fashion for themselves one invention after another, [giving themselves over to idols.] (pg. 42). So, God took on human flesh in order to destroy death to which the human race was subjected as a result of rejecting God, and "to attract [our] 'sense-oriented' attention to Himself visibly as man, and so to lead [us]

We know Him to be the Actual Creator of everything, including life itself, because He resurrected from the dead, destroying death - a genuine act of recreation. Hence, God is not simply an God is with us in the flesh as Perfect impartial supreme being of the universe. God is now before us as one of lus and we also call Him our Father -apoint that St. Paul emphasizes in his Epistle to the Galatians (read at the Christmas Liturgy): "God sent forth His Son, born of woman, born under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons...God has sent the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying, 'Abba, Father.'" (4: 4-6).

> Yes, God is with us even in our pains and sufferings, as well. Paul also notes in his Epistle to the Hebrews, "Therefore, He had to be made like His brethren in every respect, so that He might become a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God...For, because He Himself has suffered and been tempted, He is able to help those who are tempted." (2: 17-18).

Christ is God and, as His Name indicates, God is With Us — Emmanuel! With Christ, we can end so much suffering. The suffering that comes from sin is remedied by repentance; the suffering that comes from the world is remedied through forgiveness, repent-

REFLECTION FROM METROPOLITAN GERASIMOS FOR THANKSGIVING

It was in 1621 that the first religious gathering for Thanksgiving took place. And now, over 400 years later, the traditions of this holiday still hold strong and have expanded to provide an opportunity for families to come together, to break bread, to convey gratitude, and to "give thanks to the Lord, for He is good, for His steadfast love endures forever!" (Psalm 107:1-2)

Thanksgiving has a unique significance in the Greek Orthodox tradition. While this is not a religious holiday, the spirit of thanksgiving is prevalent in our Orthodox faith as a time for reflection, gratitude, and a renewed awareness of God's abundant blessings.

One of the central themes in the Greek Orthodox faith is Eυχαριστία – Thanksgiving. The Divine Liturgy is a profound act of thanksgiving, where faithful come together to offer gratitude to God for His redeeming love and the gift of salvation through Jesus Christ. The Eucharist is the ultimate expression of this thanksgiving, as Orthodox Christians partake in the Body and Blood of Christ, giving thanks for the sacrifice of Jesus Christ upon the Cross.

Thanksgiving within the Greek Orthodox tradition also reminds us of the importance of gratitude in our daily lives. Gratitude is not just a fleeting emotion but a way of life. It is an attitude that acknowledges God's providence and love in all circumstances, whether in times of joy or hardship.

We live in a broken world, surrounded by violence, war, religious persecution, and racial intolerance, as well as natural disasters that have destroyed God's creation. We must be vigilant and pray to God for healing in our world, and for unity and peace to prevail.

As we celebrate Thanksgiving, let us use this as an opportunity to give thanks for God's many

blessings—the gifts of life, health, family, friends, and the abundance of His creation. It is a time to offer heartfelt thanks for the spiritual guidance and support of our clergy and fellow parishioners, as well as for the opportunities to grow in faith and holiness.

Giving thanks goes beyond words; it is expressed in action. It is a call to love and serve our neighbors, to extend hospitality to strangers, and to show compassion to those in need. It is these acts of kindness and generosity that we embody the true spirit of thanksgiving and fulfill the teachings of Christ.

This Thanksgiving, let us remember that our faith calls us to be thankful, not only for what we have, but also for who we are becoming through our relationship with God. May our hearts overflow with gratitude, and may our lives be a living testimony of thanksgiving, reflecting the love and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.

St. John Chrysostom writes, "Nothing is so agreeable to God as a grateful and thankful soul." May the spirit of gratitude and God's unwavering love fill your hearts on this day and always."

Why is it we apply worldly productivity to spiritual efforts? If I do MORE, do it FASTER, do it BETTER will I be HOLIER? Absolutely not. The worldly constraints of achievement does not apply to the spiritual life. We are asked to slow down, consider, ponder and reflect. We are asked, in terms of our spiritual life, to gently walk through the eternal life of prayer, study, worship

study, worship and participation in the Holy Mysteries of the Church. Unfortunately we conflate the two. We often treat prayer and worship as tasks to achieve, and our worldly work as a time to slow down and be considerate of ourselves. The scriptures remind us to be a "worker worthy of his wages" and to "be still and know that I am God". Let us approach our life in this world and our spiritual lives in the appropriate manner for each. Both reveal and witness Christ to those around us.

The unintelligent soul, though immortal and the master of the body, becomes the body's slave through sensual pleasure. It does not realize that what delights the body harms the soul; but, stupid and obtuse, it seeks out such delight...Venerable and Godbearing Father Anthony the Great

St Anthony was the father of monastacism. Monks and Nuns have a special calling in life that is not a prescription for all of us. But we are all called to be in a loving relationship with God. That being said, St Anthony's point is asking the question, where does our emphasis lie? Temporal pleasure or eternal life? God wants us to enjoy the world, but always with Him in mind as the Creator of all things. If God is present in what delights the body, then it is in line with our soul and His will. If we have to shut Him out, or pretend He isn't present or we are ashamed of what we are doing, then we enslave the soul to the world instead of allowing a free, loving relationship in communion with God. Let us then put God first and our daily decisions will glorify Him.

As I have come to understand, some people resemble the honeybee and some resemble the fly. Those who resemble the fly seek to find evil in every circumstance and are preoccupied with it; they see no good anywhere. But those who resemble the honeybee only see the good in everything they see. The stupid person thinks stupidly and takes everything in the wrong way, whereas the person who has good thoughts, no matter what he sees, no matter what you tell him, maintains a positive and good thought...+ St. Paisios of Mt. Athos

This attitude difference reflects our faith and hope in God. If we believe with our whole heart in God, we seek good in all things, if we doubt or put God second, we seek the wrong, and personalize it to ourselves. St Basil said that he tries to be like the honeybee, learning the good from every interaction. Taking the good nectar from every "flower" he encounters. When we look at things with the blinders of ego and pride, and only seek to criticize or take offense, we miss the good nectar and make no progress. Let us see all things through spiritual eyes and take the good nectar from every encounter.

To see our sins in their multitude and in all their; abomination is indeed a gift of God bestowed in consequence of fervent prayer... St. John, Wonderworker of Kronstadt

The Theotokos is our example of purity and innocence and when we pray to her and think of her, we become acutely aware of our own sinfulness, which leads to repentance. This is a very positive thing for us. Repentance leads to the Holy Mystery of Confession which reconciles us to God. This reconciliation is why Christ our God, took flesh and sacrificed Himself for us. St Athanasios said... "God became man so man could become like god". Our repentance returns us to our original created state in communion with God. So let us contemplate the virtues of our most holy Theotokos, first her humility and then her purity, especially on this her beautiful feast of the entry into the Temple, and let those virtues live in us as well.
