- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- 2. Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

REPENTANCE MEANS PRAYER

Our relationship with God and with others is related to prayer. In prayer we seek forgiveness, blessings, and wisdom from God. Through prayer we seek enlightenment from God so that we can forgive others and bless them with good deeds and proper advice in guiding them to a life of peace and well-being. Prayer is a matter of being in the presence of Christ our God. Indeed, as we find ourselves in His presence, we come to understand our need to change our ways: instead of being negligent and

self-centered, we become people who love God and others. This change is seen in our behavior—and our behavior, if it is sincere and consistent, changes our personality.

One of the best examples regarding this is found in the person of Zacchaeus. As soon as he found himself in the presence of Christ, he changed from being a ruthless tax collector into being an apostle of our Lord. In reality, he eventually became a bishop of the Church. As bishop, he lived the Lord's Prayer,

COMMEMORATION OF THE RELICS OF ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM

St. John Chrysostom served as Archbishop of Constantinople during the reign of Arcadius and Evdoxia. However, Evdoxia had committed adultery during her marriage to Arcadius. St. John Chrysostom called for her to repent and live a virtuous life. Instead, the Empress Evdoxia had him exiled from Constantinople. He departed this life in the village of Comana, Armenia in 407 A.D. When Emperor Arcadius passed away, his son, Emperor Theodosius II, arranged for his bodily remains (a.k.a. relics of a Saint) to be brought back to Constantinople approximately 438 A.D. (commemorated on January 27th every year). The crusaders of the 4th Crusade in 1204 had sacked Constantinople and took the relics of St. John Chrysostom to Rome, along with those of St. Gregory the Theologian.

The relics of both of these Saints were returned to Constantinople in a special ceremony with our Patriarch Bartholomew at the Vatican on November 27, 2004.

Η προσευχή είναι θέμα παρουσίας του Θεού μας Χριστού. Μάλιστα, καθώς ευρισκόμεθα στην παρουσίαν Του, καταλαβαίνουμεν την ανάγκη να αλλάξουμεν τους τρόπους μας: αντί να είμεθα αμελής και <εγωκεντρικοί,> γινόμεθα άνθρωποι που αγαπούν τον Θεόν και άλλους. Αυτή η αλλαγή φαίνεται στην συμπεριφοράν μας – και η συμπεριφορά μας, εάν είναι ειλικρινής και συνεπής, αλλάζει την ολόκληρην προσωπικότητάν μας.

Ενα από τα καλύτερα παραδείγματα περί τούτου ευρίσκεται στο πρόσωπο του Ζακχαίου. Μόλις ευρέθηκε στην παρουσίαν του Χριστού, άλλαξε από το να είναι είνας αδίκαστος τελώνης στο να είναι απόστολος του Κυρίου μας. Στην πραγματικότηταν, έγινε ένας επίσκοπος της Εκκλησίας. Ως επίσκοπος, εζούσε την Κυριακήν Προσευχήν που λέγεται πριν μεταλαμβάνουμεν τα Άχραντα Μυστήρια.

Ο λόγος γιά τον οποίον απαγγέλλουμεν την Κυριακήν Προσευχήν πριν από την Θ. Κοινωνίαν είναι επειδή είναι μιά προσευχή που μας τοποθετεί στην παρουσίαν του Χριστού. Επίσης, αυτή η προσευχή μας καλεί σε μετάνοιαν.

which we recite during the Divine Liturgy just before we partake of Holy Communion.

The reason for why we recite the Lord's Prayer before receiving the Holy Sacraments is because it is a prayer that places us before Christ and, in addition, this prayer calls us to repentance. The Russian Orthodox Bishop Nikolai Velimirovic once said, "For Christ's presence is like that of some life-giving, scented balsam which restores health, enriches life and gives savor to the soul, the thoughts, the words of any person. In brief, distance from Christ means corruption and death, and closeness to Him means salvation and life."

Prayer itself is an act of repentance, because it turns our minds around. Sincere prayer helps us to look into our own souls so that we can grow closer to God. Through the Lord's Prayer, we are able to examine our souls. Specifically, we confess that God is our Father in heaven and that we should keep His Name holy, rather than to commit blasphemy; we confess that we are to be doing God's Will rather than our own self-centered will; we confess that we are to acknowledge our own weaknesses and failures, seeking forgiveness from God as we make the effort to correct our faults; we confess that we are to forgive others, rather than to hold grudges. Finally, we confess that we are to resist temptation and avoid evil (which recalls our Baptismal vow). The word translated as "evil" in English is ponirhoes in Greek, which technically means: "crafty and deceptive". We can use the Lord's Prayer as a guide to the Sacrament of Holy Confession.

Zaccheaus confessed his sin to our Lord: "If I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will restore it four-fold." We are reminded by theologians of The Orthodox Study Bible: By the word "if", Zaccheaus not only admits that this is a possibility, since this is how he did his work, but he implies that he will not dispute anyone's claims. Not only did he confess his sin, but he offered the penance to correct it." (pg. 1403). All of this occurred because he encountered Christ our God. As a result, salvation came to his house. Let us keep in mind that salvation comes to our houses and families in the same way.

<u>Hymn for St. John Chrysostom</u>: Ee tou stomatos sou... (The grace that from your mouth shone forth like a torch illumined the universe. It deposited in the world the treasures at the absence of avarice. It showed us the height that is attained by humility. Now you instruct us by your words. Father John Chrysostom. Intercede with Christ God, the Word Himself, entreating Him to save our souls.)

<u>Hymn for St. George</u>: Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis... (As the one who sets the captives free and the protector of the poor; as physician to the sick and the champion defender of Kings, bearer of trophies are you O Great Martyr George. Intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.)

<u>Sunday Kontakion Hymn</u>: O mitran aghiasas to toko Sou...(You sanctified the virginal womb by Your birth, O Lord, and blessed the hands of Symeon fittingly, O Christ God; and even now You came and saved us. Give peace to our Nation in time of strife and empower our leaders, so loved by You, the only One Who loves humanity.)

THE THREE HOLY HIERARCHS: ST. BASIL THE GREAT, ST. GREGORY THE THEOLOGIAN and ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM

These three Saints were hierarchs (i.e., bishops) of the Orthodox Church in the 4th Century. We commemorate them together on January 30th every year in order to remind the faithful of every generation to learn as much as possible about the Orthodox Christian Faith and to be ready to defend this time.

In particular, the Three Hierarchs had learned about the popular philosophies of their age, which were influenced by ancient Hellenism. By understanding the ancient arts of rhetoric and logic, the Three Hierarchs turned these arts against those very philosophers who worshiped idols, instead of our Savior. The worship of Zeus, Apollo, Athena,

and other false gods have nothing in common with the message of the Gospel. Many philosophers, stoics and hedonists, of their time, would argue in favor of worshiping their false gods. To debate them-and win-the Hierarchs used their education in language, rhetoric and logic to convert these people to Christ our God. Above all, the Three Hierarchs spoke the language of the Holy Spirit, Who gave proper wisdom in their words.

precious Faith in the face of false teachings of the We can celebrate the Feast Day of these Three Hierarchs by following their example of using education for God's glory, rather than for simple personal advantages, or to gloat over ancient glories. We can use education as a great tool in order to convert others to the Faith as did Sts. Basil the Great, Gregory the Theologian and John Chrysostom, who saw education as a major tool to do God's Will for the salvation of others.
