Holy Communion Order

- 1. Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- 2. Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiv-ing.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

PSALM 50 & THE PUBLICAN

"And the publican stood afar off and would not so much as raise his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast saying, 'Have mercy on me a sinner.' I tell you this man went down to his house justified rather than the other." (St. Luke 18: 13-14). The "other" is the Pharisee who "prayed about himself," listing all of his good qualities and thought of himself as being a better person than the "lowly" publican.

From this parable of our Savior, we find the basis for the well known *Jesus Prayer*: "Lord, Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner." These are

the same words as those used by the Publican. Furthermore, the simple prayer, "Lord have mercy" is said repeatedly in the liturgical life of our Orthodox Church. In fact, what I consider to be the "Psalm of Repentance," Psalm 50 is read or chanted at almost every Church Service. On Sundays it is read twice – once during Orthros (when it is usually chanted) and again during the Divine Liturgy, by the priest as he censes the Holy Icons and the faithful. The appeal for God's mercy is the underlying theme of

THE PUBLICAN AND THE PHARISEE – The Pharisees were an ancient and outstanding sect among the Jewish People. They were known for their diligent observance of the outward matters of the Law. Our Lord Jesus in His parable of the Publican and the Pharisee signified a person like the Pharisee, and a sinner like the Publican, to teach His disciples the harm of pride and the profit of humble-mindedness. Since the chief weapon for virtue is humility, and the greatest hindrance to it is pride, the Holy Tradition of the Orthodox Church has been to set aside the next three weeks (four Sundays, including today) before the Forty-day Fast as a preparation for the spiritual struggles of virtue. This is called the "Triodion Season" and calls us to contemplate the approaching season of Great Lent. This is a time when the virtue of humility is emphasized as being the foundation for all our spiritual efforts. By appointing that the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee be read today, even before the Fast begins, we are taught through the vaunting of the Pharisee, that pride and self promotion drives away the grace of the Spirit, strips us of all his virtue, and flings us far away from God. It is through the repentance and contrite prayer after the example of the Publican, that humility confers upon the sinner forgiveness and raises one up to the greatest heights.

«Καί ο τελώνης...ἕτυπτεν εἰς τό στήθος αὐτοῦ, λέγων, ὁ Θεός... ἰλάσθητί μοι τῷ αμαρτωλῷ.> (Λκ. 18:13).Ο Φαρισαίος, ὁμως, <επροσευχόταν περί του εαυτού του,> και ανέφερε τα καλά του χαρίσματα. Εθεώρησε τον εαυ– τόν του ως ένας που είναι καλύ– τερος από τον <χαμένον> Τελώνην.

Από αυτήν την παραβολήν του Χριστού, υπάρχει η βάσις γιά την γνωστήν ευχήν: <*Κύριε, Ιησού Χριστέ, Υιέ Θεού, ελέησόν με ο αμαρτωλός.>* Είναι σχεδόν τα ίδια λόγια του Τελώνου, σύμ– φωνα με την παραβολήν του Κυρίου. Η απλή ευχή, <*Κύριε ελέησον>* επαναλαμβάνεται συνεχώς κατα τις εκτελέσεις των Θ. Ακολουθιών της Εκκλησίας.

Μάλιστα, ο 50ος Ψαλμός τον οποίον θεωρώ ως <ο Ψαλμός της Μετανοίας> αναγινώσκεται ή ψάλλεται κατά την εκτέλεσην του Όρθρου και της Θ. Λειτουργίας. Αρχίζει ο 50ος Ψαλμός με τα ίδια λογια του Τελώνου:<Ελέησόν με ...> και ο ολόκληρος Ψαλμός συνεχίζει με την γενικήν αιτησην προς τον Κύριον:<ιλάσθητί μοι τω αμαρτωλώ >. Ο 50ος Ψαλμός περιγράφει τον Τελώνην, ο οποίος <ούκ ήθελεν οὐδέ τους όφθαλμοῦς εἰς τόν οὑρανόν ἐπάραι, ἀλλά ἐτυπτεν εἰς τό στήθος αυτοῦ, λέγων, ἰλάσθητί μοι τῷ άμαρτωλφ.>(Λκ. 18:12).

Περιγράφει, μάλιστα, ο 50ος Ψαλμός την αρετήν της ταπειν– οφροσύνης. Η ταπεινοφροσύνη είναι η οδός προς την μετάνοιαν, συνεχίζοντας προς την αιώνιον ζωήν, αφου επιτρέπει την χάριν του Αγίου Πνεύματος να μας αγιάσει. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ Psalm 50, which is echoed with words of the Publican, *"Have mercy upon me."*

Psalm 50 speaks to issue of judgment. The Pharisee considered it to be his right to judge others, in essence saying, "I am not a sinner, "*not even like this Publican!*" The Publican, on the other hand, accepted that only God is the One Who is right in judging others, as spoken in Psalm 50: "...*That You may be justified in Your words and overcome when [even] You are judged.* (v. 6). It is because only Christ our God is the Righteous Judge that the Publican seeks His mercy. For, if it were not that our God is the True Judge, there would be no need to seek mercy from Him at all.

The judgment of God is that the Pharisee is condemned; the Publican is saved. While the Pharisee passed judgment on himself as one who is not a sinner, the Publican acknowledged the need for God's mercy *because* he is a sinner.

The Publican provides the picture of humility. Humility is, in fact, the one virtue by which we can acquire God's mercy. With this, we find the comparison between the Publican and King David, the author of Psalm 50. The Psalm is composed from a humbled heart, saying, in essence, "I have sinned!...Create a clean heart in me, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Do not cast me away from Your presence and take not Your Holy Spirit away from me." (v.11-13). The road to repentance and on to salvation, then, is paved by our humility, since the Holy Spirit can work in us only if we are humble. In turn, the only gift that we can ever give to Christ our God is our heart-felt humility. Psalm 50 tells us so: "If You desired sacrifice, I would give it; You will not be pleased with whole burnt offerings. A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit – a broken and humbled heart God will not despise." (v. 18-19).

Today is the beginning of a liturgical season of the Church which is called "The Triodion." It is a season forecasting the beginning of Great Lent. It is a time for us to remind ourselves of the virtue of humility before Christ and to seek His mercy, with the same fervor as that expressed in Psalm 50 and which is characterized by the Publican. We need our Lord's mercy: 1) to forgive us of our sins, and, 2) to guide our thinking so that we avoid evil and do all things that are good to God's glory.

ANTIPHON I:

<u>Verse 1</u>: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and everything within me, bless His holy name." *Response:* "*Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas.*"

<u>Verse 2</u>: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His rewards." *Response: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, O save us."*

<u>Verse 3</u>: "The Lord prepared His throne in heaven, and His Kingdom rules over all." *Response: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."*

Chanter(s): "Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, both now and forever and to the ages of ages. <u>Amen</u>".

Response: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

ANTIPHON II:

<u>Verse 1:</u> "Praise the Lord, O my soul! I shall praise the Lord while I live; I shall sing to my God as long as I exist.

Response: "Soson imas Ie Theou, o Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si: Allilouia."

<u>Verse 2:</u> "Blessed is he whose help is the God of Jacob; his hope is in the Lord his God." *Response: Save us, O Son of God, Who arose from the dead, we sing to You: Alleluia.*

<u>Verse 3:</u> "The Lord shall reign forever; your God, O Zion, to all generations." *Response: "Soson imas Ie Theou, o Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si: Allilouia."*

<u>Chanter(s): "Doxa Patri ke Io, ke Ayio Pnevmati, ke nin ke ai ke is tous eonas ton eonon. Amin.</u>" People: O Monogenis Ios ke Logos tou Theou... (O Only-Begotten Son and Word of God...)

ANTIPHON III: This is the day the Lord made; let us greatly rejoice and be glad therein.

<u>Resurrection Hymn:</u> Ton synanarchon Logon [Tone 5]... (Let us, the faithful, praise and worship the Word, coeternal with the Father and the Spirit, Who for our salvation was born of a Virgin for He willed to be lifted up bodily upon the Cross, to endure death and to raise the dead by His glorious Resurrection.)

<u>Hymn for St. Theodore of Tyre</u>: Meghala ta tis pisteos ... (Faith can accomplish great things! Because of its power, the Holy Great Martyr Theodore rejoiced in the midst of flames as if he had been in refreshing water. Burned by the flames, he was offered to the Holy Trinity as delightful bread. Through his supplications, O Christ God, have mercy on us.)

<u>Hymn for St. George</u>: Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis... (*As the one who sets the captives free and the protector of the poor; as physician to the sick and the champion defender of kings, bearer of trophies are you, O Great Martyr George, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.)*

<u>Kontakion Hymn</u>: Fariseh-ou feeghomen ipsighorian...(Let us flee the Pharisee's exalted parlance; let us learn the Publican's humble demeanor, and with sighs unto the Savior cry out and say, "To us be gracious, O only forgiving Lord.")
