#### THE OLDER BROTHER

There are at least five lessons that we can draw from the Parable of the Prodigal Son:

- 1) Our desires play a great role with regard to our actions—the Prodigal wanted to be free from his father and decided to leave him. By analogy, the desire to depart from God is the cause of sin.
- 2) The consequences of sin are tragic and ultimately lead to death, as in the case of the Prodigal who eventually lost his human dignity.

- 3) The road to God begins with repentance. Repentance began for the Prodigal Son at the moment when "he came to his senses" and decided to return to this father. Humility is needed.
- 4) God loves us and forgives us and, therefore, there is Divine joy when a person turns to God (as demonstrated by the father who rejoiced when he saw his son).
- 5) To the extent that we consider ourselves to be sinless, our pride

UNWORTHY, YET PRECIOUS — Like all of our Lord's Parables, the Parable of the Prodigal Son, gives us insight into our relationship with God from God's perspective. Sin is the rejection of God. There is no excuse for sin. Efforts to blame God and/or others are based on our delusion, because we dismiss the fact that God has given us Free Will and that, if we would always turn to Him in prayer, He will give us the wisdom and the means to work all things out for the good in His glory. From God's perspective, sin makes us lost to Him. This is a tragedy. In the Parable, "unworthiness" is synonymous with "being lost" from God.

Having been created in the Image and Likeness of God, we are not inherently or permanently unworthy of God's love. Christ God rejoices when we realize that we want to make the effort to return to Him after falling into sins. In this way, we are no longer *lost* (unworthy), but we are now *found* like God's precious treasure. We are so valuable to God that He gave His Only-Begotten Son to die on the Cross in order to change us from being lost to being found – from being unworthy of Paradise (like Adam and Eve) to being precious members of God's House (like the Prodigal Son and all the Saints).

Υπάρχουν τουλάχιστον πέντε πνευματικά μαθήματα που παίρνουμεν από την Παραβολήν του Ασώτου: 1) Η θέλησίς μας παίζει μεγάλο ρόλο στις πράξεις μας και, γιά αυτόν τον λόγον, πρέπει να προσέξουμεν να μην αποφύγουμεν από τον Θεόν ποτέ – δηλ., να μην αμαρτάνου– μεν (όπως ο Άσωτος εξέφυγε από τον πατέραν του),2) Η συνέπειες της αμαρτίας είναι τραγικές και θανάσιμες (όπως έχασε ο Άσωτος την αξιοπρέπειάν του), 3) Η οδός προς τον Θεόν αρχίζει με την μετάνοιαν (η μετάνοια άρχισε γιά τον Άσωτον την στιγμήν που <είς εαὐτόν δε έλθῶν.> Απεφάσησε να υποστρέψει στον πατέραν του), 4) Ο Θεός μας αγαπά και μας συγχωρεί, και υπάρχει θεϊκή αγαλλίασις όταν πλησιάζουμεν τον Θεόν (όπως ο πατέρας του Ασώτου εχάρηκε όταν ευρίκε τον Άσωτον Υιόν του), 5) Οσο νομίζουμεν ότι είμεθα αναμάρτητοι (όπως ενόμιζε ο μεγάλος αδελφός του Ασώτου), η υπεριφάνεια μας κάνει να κατηγορήσουμεν άλλους, και, όσο δεν νιώθουμεν χαρά γιά την μετάνοιαν του συνανθρώπου μας, μένουμεν αιωνίως έξω από την Βασιλείαν του Θεού (όπως ο αδελφός του Ασώτου έμεινε στο τέλος έξω από το πατρικό του σπίτι).

Ας προσέξουμεν να μην ευρισκώμεθα έξω από την Βασιλείαν του Κυρίου διά μέσου της υπεριφάνιας και της ζήλιας. Η ζήλια έδιωξε τον αδελφόν του Ασώτου από το σπίτι του πατέρα του όπως από την αρχήν η επιθυμία γιά την ακράτητην ελευθερίαν έδιωξε τον Άσωτον Υιόν από το σπίτι του πατέρα του επίσης. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

leads us to condemn others and, to the extent that we do not feel joy for their repentance, we remain outside the Kingdom of God (as did the Prodigal's brother, who, at the end, remained outside of his father's house).

We must be careful that we are not found outside of God's Kingdom by way of pride and jealousy. These are the traits that drove the older brother away from his father with as much power as did the younger brother's desire for unbridled freedom.

The case of the Prodigal Son's older brother provides us with an opportunity to understand the importance of avoiding such sinful traits as pride and jealousy. Pride leads us to want to feel more important than others, while, jealousy leads us to dislike those who, based on our illusions and deceptions, seem to us as being more important. Through pride and jealousy, the devil deceives us into misreading the love that others have to offer us. The older brother remained outside of the Kingdom because he *misread* the love of his father (i.e., the love of God) as an *unfair* love. Accordingly, if his father loved him, he *owed* more to him than to his younger brother. This is what made the older brother angry, rather than being grateful for all that his father gave to him from the beginning. His own love also was warped by his pride and jealousy, which led him to be "faithful" to his father with motives not arising from real love for his father, but from his own self-interests.

Sadly, the mentality of the older brother seems all too normal for people in our day and age. But, as it would appear in today's world, normalcy certainly does not lead to automatic happiness.

We can see, then, how we can be so easily tricked into sins by the devil, who prompts us to feel pride and jealousy, suggesting that such feelings are "normal." St. Gregory of Sinai has this advice for us: "You need great discernment in order to distinguish between good and evil. So do not readily or lightly put your trust in appearances [or feelings], but weigh things well, testing everything to cleave to what is good and reject what is evil...The devil does not transform himself to produce these effects: he cannot induce you to be gentle; to be forbearing, or to be humble. [He cannot keep you from praying or overcoming temptations]...Instead, He produces vanity and arrogance. Thus, you can tell from its effect whether [it] is from God or from the devil." (Philokalia, Vol. 4. "On Prayer: Seven Texts," pg. 1751).


