TO ACQUIRE THE HOLY SPIRIT

Faith in Christ produces love for others, because Christ personifies the Divine Love. Thus, it is impossible to love God and to not love our fellow human being. This love was manifested by the friends of the paralytic: "When they could not come near Him [i.e., Christ] because of the crowd, they uncovered the roof where He was and, when they broke through, they let down the bed on which the paralytic was lying." (St. Mark 2:4).

We also note the reality that forgiveness of sins and the healing of maladies are tied together. By way of healing the paralytic, our Lord shows that He has the authority to forgive sins, since He Himself is God. In this, Christ teaches us that the work toward healing is a matter of love, through which our good intensions and good deeds intended for the benefit of others go together with the grace of forgiveness.

In the end, prayer is the fruit of faith and love, while at the same time, faith and love are the products of prayer. St. Gregory Palamas, whose memory we commemorate today, taught that prayer is not so much a matter of "asking for material goods," as much as it is a *Continued on page 2*

ST. GREGORY PALAMAS — This divine Father, who was from Asia Minor, was from childhood reared in the royal court of Constantinople, where he was instructed in both religious and secular wisdom. Later, while still a youth, he left the imperial court and struggled in asceticism on Mount Athos, and in the Skete at Beroea. He spent some time in Thessalonica being treated for an illness that came from his harsh manner of life. He was present in Constantinople at the Council that was convened in 1341 against Barlaam of Calabria, and at the Council of 1347 against Acindynus, who was of like mind with Barlaam; Barlaam and Acindynus claimed that the grace of God is created. At both these Councils, the Saint contended courageously for the true dogmas of the Church of Christ, teaching in particular that divine grace is not created, but is the uncreated energies of God which are poured forth throughout creation: otherwise it would be impossible, if grace were created, for man to have genuine communion with the uncreated God. In 1347 he was appointed Metropolitan of Thessalonica. He tended his flock in an apostolic manner for some twelve years, and wrote many books and treatises on the most exalted doctrines of our Faith; and having lived for a total of sixty-three years, he reposed in the

Η πίστη στον Χριστό παράγει αγάπη για τους άλλους, επειδή ο Χριστός προσωποποιεί τη Θεία Αγάπη. Έτσι, είναι αδύνατο να αγαπάμε τον Θεό και να μην αγαπάμε τον συνάνθρωπό μας. Αυτή η αγάπη εμφανίσθηκε από τους φίλους του παραλυτικού: «Μη δυνάμενοι να πλησιάσωσιν εις Αυτόν [τον Χριστόν] εξ αιτίας του όχλου, εχάλασαν την στέγην όπου ήτο, και διατρυπήσαντες καταβιβάζουσι τον κράββατον εφ ου κατέκειτο ο παραλιτικός,» (Μκ. 2:4).

Γνωρίζουμε επίσης την πραγματικότητα ότι η συγχώρησις των αμαρτιών και η θεραπεία των ασθενειών συνδέονται. Με τη θεραπεία του παραλυτικού, ο Κύριος δείχνει ότι εχει την εξουσίαν να συγχωρεί τις αμαρτίες, αφού ο Ιδιος είναι ο Θεός. Ως εκ τούτου, ο Χριστός μας διδάσκει ότι το έργο προς θεραπείαν γιά όλους είναι θέμα της «εν Χριστώ» αγάπης, κατά την οποίαν οι καλές προθέσεις, καθώς και οι καλές πράξεις προς συμφερον του συνανθρωπου μας συμβαδίζουν με τη χάρη της συγχωρήσεως.

Στο τέλος, η προσευχή είναι καρπος της πίστεως και της αγάπης, ενώ ταυτοχρόνως, η πίστις και η αγάπη είναι τα προϊόντα της προσευχής. Ο Άγιος Γρηγόριος, τον οποίον μνημονεύουμεν σημερα, εδίδαξε ότι η προσευχή δεν είναι τόσο θέμα «αιτήσεως υλικών αγαθών», όσο είναι θέμα αποκτήσεως της χάριτος του Αγίου Πνεύματος, δια του οποίου η προσωπικότητά μας αντανακλά την αγάπη του Θεού. Η χάρις του Αγίου Πνεύματος εμφυτεύεται στις ψυχές μας δια μέσου του Ονόματος του Ιησού Χριστού.

matter of acquiring the Holy Spirit, through Whom our very personality reflects the Divine Love. The grace of the Holy Spirit is implanted in our souls as we continually call upon the Name of Jesus Christ. This practice embraced by Orthodox Tradition is performed by way of the "Jesus Prayer:" "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner."

Today's Gospel passage makes it clear that Christ is God. He has the authority to forgive sins and knows the thoughts lurking in our hearts. Forgiveness of sins on our part begins with faith in God—it is with faith in God that we are careful to watch over our souls in order to avoid sins and, if we have sinned, to repent. Being that Christ knows what lies in our hearts, our prayers are to begin from within our hearts and souls. Hence, St. Gregory's defense of on-going, inner prayer of the heart, is commemorated today as a part of the Church's Lenten message.

Faith in Christ God emanates from the heart and soul. As such, it is a governing factor with regard to our words and deeds. Our awareness of sin is possible, because we notice it as something apart from the love of Christ our God. The more we are apart from God, the less we are aware of sin.

Thus, upon seeing the faith of the paralytic and his companions, our Savior granted them forgiveness of sins, based on the fact that by virtue of their faith they were aware of the existence of sin in their lives. We note that they were not the ones who questioned our Savior "in their hearts" when He pronounced the forgiveness of their sins, because the forgiveness of sins yields physical strength and healing. Ultimately, the forgiveness of sins places us before our Savior where there is "no pain; no sorrow; no sighing," as is chanted during our funeral services.

In short, the healing of the paralytic gives evidence of the forgiveness of sins. Along these lines, we can better understand the mind of the Church, when She prays "for the cleansing and sanctification of both body and soul, and as a pledge of the life and Kingdom to come," as we draw near for Holy Communion — with faith.

It was declared at first by the Lord, and it was attested to us by those who heard him.

O You, Who arose from the dead, O Lord, we give glory to You.)

<u>Hymn for St. George:</u> Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis...(As the one who sets the captives free and the protector of the poor; as physician to the sick and champion defender of kings, bearer of trophies are you. O great martyr George, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.)

<u>Kontakion Hymn for this Sunday</u>: Ti ypermacho...(O Champion General, I your City now ascribe to you triumphant anthems as the tokens of my gratitude, being rescued from the terrors, O Theotokos. Inasmuch as you have power unassailable, from all kinds of perils free me so that unto you I may cry aloud: Rejoice, O unwedded Bride.)

<u>Instead of "Axion Estin,": Epi Si Cheri ke Charitomeni</u>.... See the English translation on page 135 of our Divine Liturgy books ("In you, O woman full of grace...)

Communion Hymn: Enite ton Kyrion...(Praise the Lord in the heavens; praise Him in the highest. Alleluia.)

GOSPEL—St. Mark 2:1-12 — At that time, Jesus entered Capernaum and it was reported that he was at home. And many were gathered together, so that there was no longer room for them, not even about the door; and he was preaching the word to them. And they came, bringing to him a paralytic carried by four men. And when they could not get near him because of the crowd, they removed the roof above him; and when they had made an opening, they let down the pallet on which the paralytic lay. And when Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "My son, your sins are forgiven." Now some of the scribes were sitting there, questioning in their hearts, "Why does this man

speak thus? It is a blasphemy! Who can forgive sins but God alone?" And immediately Jesus, perceiving in his spirit that they thus questioned within themselves, said to them, "Why do you question thus in your hearts? Which is easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise, take up your pallet and walk? But that you may know that the Son of man has authority on earth to forgive sins"—he said to the paralytic—"I say to you, rise, take up your pallet and go home." And he rose, and immediately took up the pallet and went out before them all; so that they were all amazed and glorified God, saying, "We never saw anything like this!"
