SUNDAY OF THE BLIND MAN

EXPERIENCING GOD'S LOVE

In the celebration of the Divine Liturgy we hear the exclamation: "Let us love one another, that we may with one mind confess." We confess the love of Christ for each one of us and our own love for Him and for one another. Love is the experience of the Divine powers, through which miracles great and small occur. While it is true that many have experienced the grace of the Holy Spirit in tangible ways, there are not many people who are willing to confess this experience, possibly due to fear, or the tempta-

One's personal experience of Christlike love is deeply engraved in the soul of an individual, and thus he or she lives life with the purpose of giving thanks to the Lord in every way. It is given that a person who is healed with the grace of Christ feels a spiritual obligation to worship the Lord as did the man who was born blind, about whom we heard from today's Gospel passage.

The Blind Man simply did not speak about things he did not know, but he gave witness to the things he did know precisely on the basis of his personal experience. We are to do the same.

THE SUNDAY OF THE BLIND MAN

The Lord Jesus was coming from the Temple on the Sabbath, when, while walking in the way, He saw the blind man mentioned in today's Gospel. This man had been born thus from his mother's womb, that is, he had been born without eyes. The Savior sent the blind man to this pool that he might wash his eyes, which had been anointed with the clay-not that the pool's water had such power, but that the faith and obedience of the one sent might be made manifest, and that the miracle might become more remarkable and known to all, and leave no room for doubt. Thus, the blind man believed in Jesus' words, obeyed His command, went and washed himself, and returned, no longer blind, but having eyes and seeing. This was the greatest miracle that our Lord had yet worked; as the man healed of his blindness himself testified, "Since time began, never was it heard that any man opened the eyes of one that was born blind," although the Lord had already healed the blind eyes of many. It was still lively in the minds of the people when Christ came to the tomb of Lazarus, for they said, "Could not this man, who opened the eyes of the blind man,

have caused that even this man should not have died?"

Ενώ είναι αλήθεια ότι πολλοί άνθρωποι έχουν βιώσει αυτήν την χάρη του Αγίου Πνεύματος με απτούς τρόπους, δεν είναι πολλοί τόσο πρόθυμοι να ομολογήσουν την εμπειρία τους, πιθανώς από τον φόβο η από τον πειρασμόν μήπως θα καυχηθούν.

Η εμπειρία ενος ανθρωπου της «εν Χριστώ» αγάπης είναι βαθιά ενσωματωμένη στην ψυχή του και έτσι ζει τη ζωήν του με σκοπον να ευχαριστήσει τον Κύριον με κάθε τρόπο. Είναι δεδωμένο ότι ο άνθρωπος που θεραπεύεται με την χάρην του Χριστού αισθάνεται ψυχικήν υποχρέωση προς τον Κύριον να Τον λατρεύει, όπως έκανε ο άνθρωπος που εγεννήθηκε τυφλός περί του οποίου ακούσαμεν κατα το ανάγνωσμα της σημερινής Ευαγγελικής περικοπής.

Απλώς ο Τυφλός δεν ομίλησε γιά ο,τι δεν ήξευρε, αλλά αδκριβώς αυτό που ήξευρε από την πείραν του το εμαρτύρησε. Το ίδιο θα κάνουμεν και εμείς. Ηδη το κάνουν πολλοί. Για αυτό, ευχαριστώ τον Θεό γιά όσους αναζητούν τα Αγια Μυστήρια της Εκκλησίας. Ωστόσο, δοξάζουν τον Χριστόν και ενθαρρίνουν άλλους. Πολλοί έχουν δηλώσει τις θεϊκές εμπειρίες τους και επιβεβαιώνουν το ότι ο Χριστός μας προστατεύει πραγματικά από το κακό. Το να δοξάζουμε τον Θεό μας δίνει ουσιαστική αξία και θείο σκοπό στη ζωή +ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ μας.

We read in the *Orthodox Study Bible* these words: "The formula, 'That I don't know, but what I do know is this,' is foundational to witnessing one's faith to others." (pg. 1443). There are many among our faithful who already give their witness to Christ's glory. Along these lines, I give thanks to God for those who seek the Holy Sacraments. For example, at the performance of the Sacraments of Holy Matrimony and Holy Baptism, I give thanks for the bride and groom; for the parents of the children; for "koumbari" and God-parents, because they bear witness for Christ by seeking these Sacraments. In an age in which Christianity is mocked and there exists the possibility of future persecution against Christianity, these are today's martyrs for the faith, many of whom would be prone to lay down their lives for God's glory and for the salvation of the souls of others.

Like so many of our faithful, drawing on his own experience with our Lord was enough for the Blind Man to grow spiritually. His spiritual growth became more evident as he continued to anchor himself in his experience of Christ's love through which he received his sight. "The man moves from knowing almost nothing about Christ (v. 25), through the conclusion that Jesus could not possibly be a sinner (v. 31), through confessing that Jesus must be from God (v. 33), to finally seeing Him as the divine Son of God and worshiping Him (v. 38)." (Orthodox Study Bible, pg. 1443).

We need to be watchful over our inner life in the spiritual struggle between wanting to simply exist, on the one hand, and wanting to live in order to inherit God's Eternal Kingdom, on the other. That which holds us back is the fantasy that we can love God and still deny Him when what is needed is to deny ourselves in order to love God and our neighbor. Dr. M. Scott Peck put it this way: "[God] is the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end... and, because we believe it, it demands from us all that we can possibly give, all that we have." (The Road Less Traveled).

We bear witness by way of our self-sacrifice of time, effort and resources to those in need, as well as by our presence in the public worship of Christ our God. In this way, many have declared their own divine experiences and verify that Christ protects us all from evil. Thus, by glorifying God we are given meaningful worth and a divine purpose for our lives. Our love -- or, rather God's love *in us* -- will feed the poor; impart hope to those in despair, and inspire others to grow to have greater faith in God's strength. It is this divine love that creates Saints and makes the Orthodox Church more alive than ever in today's world.

PRAYERS FOR READING HOLY SCRIPTURES

EPISTLE- ACTS 16:16-34 -- In those days, as we apostles were going to the place of prayer, we were met by a slave girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners much gain by soothsaying. She followed Paul and us, crying, "These men are servants of the Most High God, who proclaim to you the way of salvation." And this she did for many days. But Paul was annoyed, and turned and said to the spirit, "I charge you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour. But when her owners saw that their hope of gain was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the market place before the rulers; and when they had brought them to the magistrates they said, "These men are Jews and they are disturbing our city. They advocate customs which it is not lawful for us Romans to accept or practice." The crowd joined in attacking them; and the magistrates tore the garments off them and gave orders to beat them with rods. And when they had inflicted many blows upon them, they threw them into prison, charging the jailer to keep them safely. Having received this charge, he put them into the inner prison and fastened their feet in the stocks. But about midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them, and suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and every one's fetters were unfastened. When the jailer woke and saw that the prison doors were open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, supposing that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul cried with a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." And he called for lights and rushed in, and trembling with fear he fell down before Paul and Silas, and brought them out and said, "Men, what must I do to be saved?" And they said, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." And they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all that were in his house. And he took them the same hour of the night, and washed their wounds, and he was baptized at once, with all his family. Then he brought them up into his house, and set food before them; and he rejoiced with all his household that he had believed in God.

GOSPEL- ST. JOHN 9:1-38--As Jesus passed by, he saw a man blind from his birth. And his disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God might be made manifest in him. We must work the works of him who sent me, while it is day; night comes, when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." As he said this, he spat on the ground and made clay of the spittle and anointed the man's eyes with the clay, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). So he went and washed and came back seeing. The neighbors and those

who had seen him before as a beggar, said, "Is not this the man who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is he"; others said, "No, but he is like him." He said, "I am the man." They said to him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash'; so I went and washed and received my sight." They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know." They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the clay and opened his eyes. The Pharisees again asked him how he had received his sight. And he said to them, "He put clay on my eyes and I washed, and I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner do such signs?" There was a division among them. So they again said to the blind man, "What do you say about him, since he has opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet." The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight, until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight, and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" His parents answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; but how he now sees we do not know, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age, he will speak for himself." His parents said this because they feared the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that if anyone should confess him to be Christ he was to be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, "He is of age, ask him." So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and said to him, "Give God the praise; we know that this man is a sinner." He answered, "Whether he is a sinner, I do not know; one thing I know, that though I was blind, now I see." They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered them, "I have told you already and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you too want to become his disciples?" And they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." The man answered, "Why, this is a marvel! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but if anyone is a worshiper of God and does his will, God listens to him. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a man born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." They answered him, "You were born in utter sin, and would you teach us?" And they cast him out. Jesus heard that they had cast him out, and having found him he said, "Do you believe in the Son of man?" He answered, "And who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and it is he who speaks to you." He said, "Lord, I believe": and he worshiped him.


