- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

FAITH & RESPONSIBILITY

That which motivated the Myrrh-bearing Women to action was deep inside their souls—i.e., their love for Christ; their belief that He is God; their sense of responsibility toward what is proper. This love and belief, as well as the sense of responsibility, transcends all obstacles—represented figuratively by the "large stone" that covered our Lord's tomb and the "fear of the Pharisees." Their faith in God brought them to be the first to witness the Resurrection of Christ.

The Myrrh-bearers, like all the Saints after them, challenge us to push ourselves ever more in the advancement of our

spiritual life and in our giving of time, talent and treasure to others and to the work of our Lord's Church. In honor of the Myrrh-bearing Women, whom we commemorate today, we are all called to anoint His Sacred Body -- His Church -- with our prayers and good deeds today through our love in Christ for one another.

Along with the Myrrh-bearing Women, we commemorate Sts. Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemos. After our Lord died on the Cross, St. Joseph courageously asked the governor, Pilate, that Jesus' Body be given to him. This was a daring act. Remember that Continued on Page 2

THE ORTHODOX WORLD-VIEW--The two Sundays following the Resurrection of our God and Savior Jesus Christ carry themes of doubt vs. faith. St. Thomas' doubt was addressed by our Lord by inviting him to see reality for himself in order to proclaim the truth with faith that Christ is Lord and God.

This Sunday of the Myrrh-bearing Women addresses the virtues of love for, and faith in, God. From these first two Sundays following the celebration of Christ's Resurrection, we note that the Apostles did not share the same world-view as did other people of their times. The world was no longer an "end in itself," at best with souls being cast into the nebulous eternity of "Sheol," with no real value. Nor was the world the only place where human life is to exist. Instead, life in this world is an opportunity to experience God's love -- and then to share God's love. In this, the Apostles lived in heaven while still bearing flesh on earth, knowing that the triumphs and trials of this present world are only temporary, while the joy and peace in Christ our God is forever,, provided one turns away from evil and toward the love of God.

With this world-view, the Myrrh-bearing Women disregarded their fears and apprehensions and moved on to Christ's tomb, finding it empty, because Christ is Risen! +FR. THEODORE

Αυτό που ώθησε τοις Μυροφόρες να χρίσουν το Σώμα του Χριστού ήταν βαθιά μέσα στις ψυχές των δηλαδή, η αγάπη γιά τον Χριστό και η πεποίθηση ότι ο Χριστος είναι ο Θεός, μαζί με την αίσθηση ευθύνης γιά το σωστό. Αυτή η αγάπη και η πίστη, καθώς και η αίσθηση περί ευθύνης, υπερβαίνουν όλα τα εμπόδια - που απεικονίζονται εικονικά από τον «λίθον μέγας σφόρα» που εκάλυψε τον τάφο του Κυρίου μας και τον «φόβο των Φαρισαίων». Με πίστη στον Θεό, οι Μυροφόρες έγιναν οι πρώτοι να μαρτυρήσουν την Ανάσταση του Χριστού.

Οι Μυροφόρες, όπως όλοι οι Άγιοι μετά, μας προκαλούν να ωθήσουμε όλο και περισσότερο την πρόοδο της πνευματικής μας ζωής και την παροχή χρόνου, ταλέντου και θησαυρού σε άλλους και στο έργο της Εκκλησίας του Κυρίου μας. Προς τιμήν των Μυροφόρων, τις οποίες εορτάζουμε σήμερα, καλούμεθα όλοι να χρίσουμε το Ιερό Σώμα του Χριστού - δηλ., την Εκκλησία Του - με τις προσευχές και τις καλές μας πράξεις σήμερα μέσω της αγάπης μας για τον Χριστό και ο ένας γιά τον άλλο.

Το Άγιο Πνεύμα θα επιβεβαιώνει πάντοτε την πίστη μας στον Αναστάντα εκ νεκρών Χριστό - και, με πίστη, έρχονται τα θαύματα του Κυρίου μας. Έτσι βιώνουμε τα ίδια θαύματα με αυτά των ίδιων των Αποστόλων, «Ο λόγος του Θεού ηύξανε και επληθύνετο ο αριθμός των μαθητών.» (Πραξ. 6:7).

Ας συνεχίσουμε να καλλιεργούμε την πίστη μας στον Κύριό μας μέσω της συνεχούς προσευχής. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

Christ was crucified as a criminal. For anyone to obtain the body of a criminal for burial, other than what was allotted for common criminals, required special permission—and in seeking that permission there was the risk that one could be implicated as a criminal, as well, and given the same death sentence. In helping Joseph to carry out this request and place Jesus' Body in the tomb, Nicodemos also risked his life. They were both declaring to the world that they were friends of our Lord and Savior!

As the Myrrh-bearing Women and Sts. Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemos maintained their faith in Christ through dangerous moments, our parishioners here at St. George, while facing the dangers of this year's Coronavirus, maintained their faith in Christ our God. Such faith is manifested in the increased attendance for worship services over the past few months. Truly, with the grace of the Holy Spirit, many people maintained and even strengthened their faith throughout this year.

The Holy Spirit will always confirm our faith in Christ risen from the dead -- and, with faith come the wonders of our Lord. This is how we experience the same wonders as those experienced by the Apostles themselves, "The Word of God increased and the number of disciples multiplied." (Acts 6:7).

We will indeed experience Apostolic wonders as we continue to cultivate our faith in our Lord through continued prayer and thanksgiving to Christ. Let us hold in our minds the faith, courage, and the spiritual righteousness of the Myrrh-bearing Women, St. Joseph of Arimathea and St. Nicodemos. Let us indeed adopt the world-view of all of our Holy Saints, by which our thoughts are directed toward heaven, even though we live on earth.

EPISTLE -- Acts 6:1-7

In those days, when the disciples were increasing in number, the Hellenists murmured against the Hebrews because their widows were neglected in the daily distribution. And the twelve summoned the body of the disciples and said, "It is not right that we should give up preaching the word of God to serve tables. Therefore, brethren, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to this duty. But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word." And what they said pleased the whole multitude, and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, and Philip, and Prochoros, and Nicanor, and Timon, and Parmenas, and Nicolaos, a proselyte of Antioch. These they set before the apostles, and they prayed and laid their hands upon them. And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied greatly in Jerusalem, and a great many of the priests were obedient to the faith.

GOSPEL -- St. Mark 15:43-47; 16:1-8

At that time, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself looking for the kingdom of God, took courage and went to Pilate, and asked for the body of Jesus. And Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and sum-

moning the centurion, he asked him whether he was already dead. And when he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. And he bought a linen shroud, and taking him down, wrapped him in the linen shroud, and laid him in a tomb which had been hewn out of the rock; and he rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where he was laid. And when the sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week they went to the tomb when the sun had risen. And they were saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the door of the tomb?" And looking up, they saw that the stone was rolled back; for it was very large. And entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed in a white robe; and they were amazed. And he said to them, "Do not be amazed; you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen, he is not here; see the place where they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you." And they went out and fled from the tomb; for trembling and astonishment had come upon them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.


