ST. THADDAEUS THE APOSTLE -- Today we commemorate St. Thaddaeus the Apostle. He became a disciple of Christ, and after His Ascension he journeved to Edessa. There he catechized and baptized Abgar (see Aug. 16). Having preached in Mesopotamia, he ended his life in martyrdom. Though some call him one of the Twelve, whom Matthew calls "Lebbaeus, whose surname was Thaddaeus" (Matt. 10:3), the ancient historian Eusebius says that St. Thaddaeus is one of the Seventy: "After [Christ's] Resurrection from the dead, and His ascent into Heaven, Thomas, one of the twelve Apostles, inspired by God, sent Thaddaeus, one of the seventy disciples of Christ, to Edessa as a preacher and evangelist of Christ's teaching" (Eccl. At the Entrance of the Gospel: **1) Entrance Hymn:** "Savior, Your tomb was sealed by the Jews with a stone. Soldiers kept watch over Your sacred Body. THE CAPACITY TO MOVE MOUNTAINS

God created us in His Image and Likeness. As such, God does not ask us to do anything that we are not innately capable of doing. We are innately capable of keeping God's Commandments; we are innately capable of praying and fasting. We are capable of worshiping God. We are capable of doing good deeds. Our unwillingness to do what we are capable of doing is what makes for an unfulfilled life.

Our unwillingness to do as God Commands is related to our pride, through which we are deceived to believe that we do not need God and that we are, by virtue of our own imperfect powers, somehow invincible. Such deception comes from the devil, who fell from Paradise because of pride and, consequently, he fell away from God. Pride is the opposite of love for God, because by its nature, it does not "need" God. Indeed, how many things do we do as if God is not watching us?

If we have faith in God, we follow God's Commandments with love in our hearts. Christ God tells us that with just a little faith in His love --as little as a grain of mustard seed--nothing would be impossible for us.

We often find ourselves explaining our imperfections, or excusing them, by saying that, after all, we are all "just human." That only works in the effort of not condemning our neighbor for his or her imperfections by acknowledging that we are all imperfect. But, "being human" is not meant to be an excuse for sin and evil.

We are capable of rising above our imperfections through prayer in seeking our Lord's help. We are capable of sharpening our consciences, and strengthening our faith so that we can truly "move mountains" -- most importantly, the "mountains" that serve as huddles in our effort to live a life-style that is pleasing to God. +FR. Η απροθυμία μας να τηρούμε τις Εντολές του Θεού σχετίζεται με την υπερηφάνειά μας, μέσω της οποίας είμεθα εξαπατημένοι να πιστεύουμε ότι δεν έχουμε ανάγκη από τον Θεό και ότι είμεθα, λόγω των δικών μας ατελών δυνάμεων (κατά κάποιο τρόπο) ανίκητοι. Τέτοια απάτη προέρχεται από τον διάβολο, ο οποίος έπεσε από τον Παράδεισο λόγω υπερηφάνειας και, κατά συνέπεια, απομακρύνθηκε από τον Θεό. Η υπερηφάνεια είναι το αντίθετο της αγάπης για τον Θεό, γιατί από τη φύση της δεν «χρειάζεται» τον Θεό. Σε αυτό, πόσες δουλειές κάνουμε σαν να μην μας παρακολουθεί ο Θεός;

Είμεθα ικανοί να υπερβούμε τις ατέλειές μας μέσω της προσευχής, αναζητώντας τη βοήθεια του Κυρίου μας.
