#### PRAYER FOR READING HOLY SCRIPTURES

"Shine within our hearts, loving Master, the pure light of Your divine knowledge and open the eyes of our minds that we may comprehend the message of Your Gospel. Instill in us, also, reverence for Your blessed commandments, so that having conquered sinful desires, we may pursue a spiritual life, thinking and doing all these things that are pleasing to You. For You are the Light of our souls and bodies and to You we give glory together with Your Father Who is without beginning and Your all-holy, good, and life-giving Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages. Amen."

EPISTLE - Romans 5: 1-10

Brethren, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in our hope of sharing the glory of God. More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit which has been given to us. While we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Why, one will hardly die for a righteous manthough perhaps for a good man one will dare even to die. But God shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we are now justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life .

GOSPEL - St. Matthew 6: 22-33

The Lord said, "The eye is the lamp of the body. Father knows you need them all. B So, if your eye is sound, your whole body will his kingdom and his righteousne be full of light; but if your eye is not sound, these things shall be yours as well."

your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness! No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other. or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon. Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by being anxious can add one cubit to his span of life? And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O men of little faith? Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear? For the Gentiles seek all these things; and your heavenly Father knows you need them all. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all

#### THE VALUE OF ORTHODOX CHURCH WORSHIP

The reason why the people in Russia are Russian Orthodox Christians, is because in 988, Prince Vladimir of the Russian people sent emissaries throughout the world to report back to him and offer recommendations about what kind of religion the Russian people would follow. Upon entering the Holy Church of Aghia Sophia in Constantinople (present day Istanbul), the emissaries saw the celebration of the Divine Liturgy. They reported back to Vladimir that they felt as though they were in heaven on earth. As a result, Prince Vladimir had all of his people baptized in the Greek Orthodox Faith. Hence, today, there are about 60 million Orthodox Christians throughout Russia and they identify themselves as Russian Orthodox Christians.

In today's Gospel passage, our Lord tells us to "seek first the Kingdom of God." Vladimir's emissaries sought the Kingdom of God and found it in the celebration of the Orthodox Christian celebration of the Divine Liturgy. Like those emissaries, we are to also continuously seek the Kingdom of God, despite the confusion of our society; despite the pressures of every day living; despite the ridicule from high-profile elites. As Prince Vladimir would tell us today, the beginning and end of our seeking "first" the Kingdom of God is our sincere, prayerful, meaningful participation in the celebration of the Divine Liturgy.

Let us become emissaries to our own America, showing by our own example of love and thanksgiving, that the Divine Liturgy is an entire life-style involving heaven on earth. +FR. THEODORE

Όπως εκείνοι οι απεσταλμένοι, πρέπει επίσης να αναζητούμε συνεχώς τη Βασιλεία του Θεού, παρά τη σύγχυση της κοινωνίας μας - παρά τις πιέσεις της καθημερινής ζωής, και παρά τη γελοιοποίηση από υψηλών προδιαγραφών «σπουδαίων» ανθρώπων. #### Archepiscopal Encyclical on the Fourth of July

July 3, 2022

Unto the Most Reverend and Right Reverend Hierarchs, Pious Priests and Deacons, the Monks and Nuns, Presidents and Members of Parish Councils, Honorable Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, Members of Leadership 100, the Day and Afternoon Schools, Philoptochos Societies, the Youth, Greek Orthodox Organizations, and the entirety of the Christ-named Plenitude of the Holy Archdiocese of America:

My Beloved Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free. (John 8:32)

This Fourth of July — which we celebrate tomorrow — is a most extraordinary day for the Greek Orthodox Church of America. We are saluting the Land of the Free and the Home of the Brave, as well as the extraordinary milestones in the history of our National Church. We shall celebrate the consecration of the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine at the World Trade Center, even as we mark the centennial of the establishment of our Sacred Archdiocese — the first and preeminent Eparchy of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in the Diaspora.

One of the reasons that we have chosen the Fourth of July for the consecration is to bring into focus the truth that the rebuilding of Saint Nicholas as a Shrine for the Nation is also an act of restoration. For the essence of what it means to be an American is enshrined in the First Amendment of our Bill of Rights — that is, our freedom to believe as our conscience dictates. Our country was attacked on 9/11 as an act of hatred fueled by religious bigotry. And the only response that bears witness to our own faith and to what it means to be an American is to rebuild. To rebuild as both the original Greek Orthodox Church, but also as a space where a diversity of beliefs and respect for other faith traditions can be celebrated, taught and enshrined for all people.

Our freedom in Christ — Who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life — brings honesty to this enterprise of spiritual restoration. For it is the Lord Himself who establishes us in freedom, more than any human convention. Freedom is ultimately within our souls and mind, our hearts and our conscience. And as Greek Orthodox Americans, we celebrate the liberty to believe in accordance with our tradition, especially in our centennial year.

And so, let us take the powerful symbol of our National Shrine, together with the pivotal moment of our Archdiocesan centennial, and chart a new vision for the future — one that will honor the past, bind us to one another, and plant our ensign of the Cross squarely in our greater society. In this spirit, we can share the truth with all people, and give the gift of ultimate freedom in our Lord Jesus Christ to all the world.
