JUDGMENT SUNDAY (MEAT-FARE SUNDAY)

PRAYER FOR READING HOLY SCRIPTURES

"Shine within our hearts, loving Master, the pure light of Your divine knowledge and open the eyes of our minds that we may comprehend the message of Your Gospel. Instill in us, also, reverence for Your blessed commandments, so that having conquered sinful desires, we may pursue a spiritual life, thinking and doing all these things that are pleasing to You. For You are the Light of our souls and bodies and to You we give glory together with Your Father Who is without beginning and Your all-holy, good, and life-giving Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages. Amen."

EPISTLE— 1 Corinthians 8:8-13; 9:1-2

Brethren, food will not commend us to God. We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. Only take care lest this liberty of yours somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if any one sees you, a man of knowledge, at table in an idol's temple, might he not be encouraged, if his conscience is weak, to eat food offered to idols? And so by your knowledge this weak man is destroyed, the brother for whom Christ died. Thus, sinning against your brethren and wounding their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of my brother's falling, I will never eat meat, lest I cause my brother to fall. Am I not free? Am I not an apostle? Have I not seen Jesus our Lord? Are not you my workmanship in the Lord? If to others I am not an apostle, at least I am to you; for you are the seal of my apostleship in the Lord.

GOSPEL - St. Matthew 25:31-46

The Lord said, "When the Son of man comes in his glory and all the holy angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate them one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will place the sheep at his right hand, but the goats at the left. Then the king will say to

those at his right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not clothe me, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to me.' And they will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

JUDGMENT SUNDAY (MEAT-FARE SUNDAY) — Today is "Judgment Sunday" (or, a.k.a., "Meat-Fare Sunday"). After dedicating the last two Sundays to the theme of forgiveness — a theme which will be emphasized with next Sunday's Gospel passage — we are reminded today not to be deceived into thinking that we can live carelessly throughout our lives with the idea that "all will be forgiven" anyway. We are reminded now that we are not in control of everything around us and that it is wise for us to be prepared to give an account for our words and deeds at any time when our Lord may call us from this present life, or when He suddenly appears in glory to judge the living and the dead. Forgiving others means that we still care for them — that we visit the sick; feed the hungry, and seek shelter for those in need, even if they are among the "least of our brethren" who may have offended us in the past. +FR. WHY SHOULD WE CARE ABOUT ANOTHER PERSON'S WELLBEING?

It is not uncommon to find expressions from ancient (as well as modern) thinkers suggesting that the weak and infirm are a "drain" on society's ability to advance in power. As justification for such a suggestion, we often hear the subtle implication that the weak and infirm are relegated to "subhumanity" as punishment for their sins. Accordingly, it would be wise to neglect the weak and infirm.

It was Jesus Christ our God, Who silenced such foolish wisdom with the argument for why we *should* care about another person's wellbeing. Each one of us is God's personal treasure — the Image and Likeness of God. In his First Epistle to the Corinthians, St. Paul reminds us that our "care" is to extend beyond simply one's physical wellbeing, and to include one's spiritual wellbeing, as well. Accordingly, those who would be affected the most by our example of piety or impiety would be the weak — i.e., the children; those suffering from trauma or grief, and those enduring hardships of various kinds.

Dishonoring any person — even, as our Lord said in today's Gospel passage, "the least of our breth-ren" — is the same thing as dishonoring God. If we care about God, we must care about the other person. +FR. THEODORE


